HIGH LIGHTS 1981-82

This has been a busy year, professionally a satisfying year. We have hosted four conferences in collaboration with other organisations. We conducted a pre-conference workshop in Mysore on "Analysis and Development of Communication Skills in the Mentally Retarded" given by Dr. D.C.Kiernan of Thomas Coram Research Centre of England associated with the Combiner Asian Regional and Commonwealth Congress for the Scientific Study of Mental Deficiency (ARC) held in Bangalore. In the workshop, fifteen participants working in the area of mental retardation including the staff of the Institute participated. It proved to be a very useful one both for the participants and the parents who attended.

In September 1981, with the WHO assistance through the DGHS, we conducted a workshop on Diagnostic Proformae for Speech and Hearing Disorders. It was for seven days in which twenty six out-station specialists working in the field of speech and hearing and other allied professions and twenty four local members participated to evolve diagnostic proformae.

In the collaboration with the Indian Speech and Hearing Association we held a workshop for ten days on "Aids for the Aurally Handicapped" in which twentyone Speech Pathologists and Audiologists from all parts of the country participated. This was held basically to train the participants in repairing hearing aids and to provide information on the recent developments in the field of aids for the aurally handicapped.

We actively participated in the annual conference of Indian Speech and Hearing Association (ISHA) which was held in Mysore in January 1982. Most of our staff were involved in the organisation and professional activities of the Workshop.

The financial assistance for the distribution of hearing aids from the Union Ministry of Social Welfare has come through and that has meant a greatly increased load on our audiological services in terms of testing hearing aids and custom ear mould making.

Under the scheme we have distributed 701 hearing aids.

We held eighteen camps in various places in Karnataka and Andhra. The new omni bus which was bought during the year will be a great help in this regard.

A survey was held on 'World Health Day' at a **v**illage where four hundred families were surveyed.

The XII issue of the AIISH Journal was released. In total our staff have published fourteen papers and presented ten papers and have given three radio talks. Many of our staff attended various professional seminars and short courses.

We held short term training programmes for five school teachers deputed by the Government of Karnataka and a short term refresher/orientation training programme ranging from ten days to ten weeks in ear mould making, impedance audiometry and audio-logical evaluation.

Four 'A' type, four 'B' type and two 'C' type staff quarters have been completed and they are under occupation.

A Staff Welfare Fund has been established.

Our collegues have been offered offices on Committees of several professional organisations.

Clinical Services:

The staff evaluated all the cases for speech disorders.

Further they also counselled the cases or the parents/guardians of the cases regarding the problems and rehabilitation procedures to be used with the cases. Whenever required therapy was also given. They are also responsible for Demonstration of Administration of tests or evaluation and therapy to students and supervision of students.

The staff of the department participated in eighteen Speech and Hearing camps in which 6412 cases were examined. Some of the cases were referred to the Institute for further examinations and for therapy.

One of the lecturers of the department is acting as a co-ordinator for the camps.

It objectively describes the deviations in the speech of the Cleft Palate persons. Spectrographic analysis of the /p/ and /s/ sounds produced by five cleft palate speakers re-vealed the usage of glotteral stops and pharyngeal /s/ fricatives by the cleft palate speakers due to the lack of air pressure in the oral cavity. The acoustic features of the sounds have been described.

Consonant /t/, were measured spectrographicaly in /i/, /u/,and (a) vowel environments. Duration of consonants decreased as the following vowel was changed from /i/ to /u/ to /a/. This finding is an additional support to the existence of forward scanning mechanism in co-articulation.

Workshops:

1. Workshop on 'Diagnostic Proformae in Speech and Hearing' 14th to 20th September 1981.

This workshop was conducted with the financial assistance of the WHO for seven days in which an attempt was made to provide for representation from the different regions of the country, from different types of work environment, from different training centres and from different professions.

The workshop purported to develop proformae which could be used by all the Speech and Hearing specialists to facilitate

the communication between the specialists within the field and with specialists from various other fields who work as team members in the rehabilitation of speech and hearing handicapped.

For the first four days the groups discussed various terminology used in each proformae and various aspects tobe included in the proformae and prepared proformae for various speech and hearing problems. On the concluding days each group presented the proformae prepared by them in the presence of all the participants for discussion.

The proformae which have been evolved would be used either in their long forms or short forms by the speech and hearing specialists all over the country. The usefulness of these proformae would be judged by holding another workshop of this type in a few years' time. In the workshop twenty six outstation delegates and twenty four local members participated.

Dr. N. Rathna was the Project Director and Mrs. Saraswathi-Menon and Mr. N.P.Nataraja were the co-ordinators.

Guidance for Dissertation:

Mr. N.P. Nataraja, Lecturer in Speech Pathology:

1. Effect of masking noise on stuttering - Spectrographic Analysis:

The Binaural Masking Noise reduces stuttering. This has been explained using the increase in vowel duration, a spectrographic observation.

2. Highlighting of fluency in stutterers:

Highlighting of fluency reduces stuttering in stutterers.

Hence it is recommended as a therapy technique for stuttering.

3. Revised token test in Kannada:

The test for assessing the comprehension ability in children, adults and brain damaged patients as developed in Kannada. It is useful in studying language development in children.

4. Infant cry analysis as a diagnostic indicator:

Spectrographic analysis of cries in Infants normal and abnormal as indicated that they can be differentiated by their acoustic - characteristics present in their cries.

Further, it has been shown that the infants with various abnormalities like jaundice, low birth-weight, delayed birth-cry can be differentiated using spectrographic analysis.

Mr. G. Purushothama, Lecturer in Speech Pathology:

1. The Influence of increase in intensity and whispering on stuttering:

9 subjects underwent, 4 different experimental conditions with different levels of vocal intensities and whispering. It

has been indicated that whispering and higher levocal intensity help the stutterer to become fluent with the help of additional laryngeal feed back.

APPENDIX 'A'

Report - Workshop on 'Diagnostic Proformae in Speech & Hearing

The importance of proformae in the diagnosis of Speech and Hearing problems is well known. Each Speech and Hearing clinic has its own proformae for this purpose. We had found that the terms used and the importance given to various aspects in the proformae were varying from clinic to clinic. Therefore it was felt necessary to develop proformae which could be used by all Speech and Hearing specialists and thus to facilitate the communication between the specialists within the field and with specialists from various other fields who work as team members in the rehabilitation of Speech and Hearing handicapped. Hence, we conducted a workshop to evolve various proformae required for diagnosis of Speech and Hearing problems, involving specialists fom various fields.

The proposal was sent to WHO through DGHS. We are grateful to WHO authorities for providing us the required financial help. We thank Dr. I.D. Bajaj, DGHS, Dr. Bisht, ADDGHS, Dr. Arora, Asst.DGHS for their help in getting this financial assistance. Investigations were sent to Speech Pathologists, Audiologists, working in various clinics and centers, Otolaryngologists, Neurologists, Paediatricians.

An attempt was to provide for representation from the different regions of the country, from different types of work environment, from different training centers and from different professions.

The enclosed list of 40 out station specialists working in the field of Speech and Hearing and other allied professions and another list of 15 local participants were prepared, in consultation with the Heads of Departments of AIISH, who could be invited as participants in the workshop.

The workshop was planned for 14 days. Asmany people felt that it was too long it was decided to hold it for 7 days.

The importance of proformsolin the diagnosis of Speech

Out of forty invitees 34 conveyed their acceptance to participate in the workshop.

Various speech and hearing centers in and outside the country were requested to send the proformae used by them in their clinics. Five drafting committees formed consisting of staff and students of the Institute to prepare drafts of variatious proformae for the use of the participants during the workshot Drafts of various proformae and other relevant study materials were prepared. These formed the starting points for the wokshop.

Due to natural and un-natural calamities, only 26 outstation participants could brave the storm and participate in the workshop. 9 more speech and hearing specialists working in Mysore were invited to participate in place of out station participants who could not reach Mysore. So totally 23 local participants took part in the workshop.

The workshop was inaugurated by Dr. GN.Reddy, Director, NIMHANS, Bangalore, on 14th September 1981, at 11 A.M. Dr. CP. Natarajan, Director, CFTRI, Mysore, presided over the function.

Dr.N.Pathna, Director, AIISH, explained to the delegates that the draft proformae provided by us could be used as outlines to prepare proformae for specific speech and hearing problems, and to prepare different proformae in long and short forms, to be used for various purposes in hospitals, schools, research in camps, clinics, industrial units and surveys. The delegates were also told that it is hoped that the proformae developed by these groups would help in more informative and economical evaluation of cases and in the use of well defined terms with the view to facilitate communication among the members of the rehabilitative team for speech and hearing problems in India and abroad. The groups were also requested to arrive at a common format for sending reports to various professionals and other members of the rehabilitation team.

APPENDIX B

Report on workshop on 'Aids for the Aurally Handicapped'

workshop on 'Aids for the Aurally Handicapped was conducted at this Institute in collaboration with the Indian Speech and Hearing Association. The workshop was conducted from 12th October to 21 October 1981 (10 days).

The workshop was inaugurated by Mr. Srinivasan, Director, ISI, Bangalore. Totally 21 Speech Pathologists and Audio-logists from all over the country participated in the workshop. Basically the workshop was conducted to train the participants in repairing hearing aids, and to provide information regarding the recent developments in the field of aids for the aurally handicapped. The participants had practical and theory classes during these ten days by the staff of the department of electronics and audiology. The participants felt that the workshop was very useful and requested for more workshops of this type.

The workshop was concluded with a lecture by Dr.K.Gopal, Reader in Physics, University of Mysore on 'Microprocessors'.

I. TRAINING PROGRAMME

(a) Undergraduate and Post-graduate:

The training programme for the undergraduate and graduate students continued under the semester and non-semester scheme.

Educational films with professional relevance on hearing evaluation, noise measurements and psycho-acoustics were included as a part of the training programme. Six films were borrowed from the British Council Library and also a list of films to be borrowed from them for the subsequent screening. Efforts were made in collecting more audiovisual aids for training programme and it was arranged with the National Education and Information Films Limited for the preview of film on the Inner Ear.

In Hearing Science Lab the oscilioscope was used for demonstrating psychoacoustic phenomenon.

Six dissertation and nineteen independent projects were completed under the guidance of the staff of the Department. In progress are eleven independent projects and six dissertations.

(b) Short-term training:

A short-term training programme for five school teachers deputed by the Government of Karnataka, were conducted in the middle of 1981.

A short-term refresher/orientation training programme ranging from ten days to ten weeks was given in earmould making, impedance audiometry and audiological evaluation.

(c) Guest Lectures/Demonstrations

A demonstration was given by M/s. Alps International (P) Ltd., in electro-acoustics measurement of hearing aids.

Mr. Srinivasan, Regional Director, ISI gave a lecture on environmental tests, with particular reference to hearing aids.

Mr. N. Sethi, M/s Kardio Control, gave a demonstration regarding the use of Electric Response Audiometry.

Hearing Science Lab was used to gave demonstration to students in automatic gain control, masking, and filtered speech.

HEARING AIDS:

(a) Hearing Aid Evaluation

In total 2078 patients were examined for hearing aid evaluations. The number included those who came for re-evaluation, demonstration and counselling.

The following types of hearing aids are being used for trial purposes:- (1) Body level (2) Spectacle type AC/BC (3) Behind the ear. Total number available for trial purpose is twenty one.

In all cases where hearing aid was found useful, prescription of suitable models for purchase were made out for patients. Number of prescriptions given were 1257.

The work load was increased as a result of free hearing aids issued to the cases with income below Rs.750/- per month and with an income of Rs.751/- to Rs.1500/- per month, the aid/ prosthesis was supplied at 50% of the cost. The grant for these hearing aids was provided by the Ministry of Social Welfare Government of India.

Fiftyone Danish Hearing Aids issued earlier under the Indo-Danish Scheme were returned for reasons such as new hearing aids were issued, the user had passed away. 14 spare parts were issued.

(b) EARMOULD

A total number of 1667 earmoulds and six prosthesis were made for the patients. The increase in the number of earmoulds were due to free issue of hearing aids provided by the Ministry of Social Welfare through the Institute. Nine special types of earmoulds such as skeleton moulds were prepared for cases needing them. Apart from earmoulds, the laboratory has made six prosthetic aids for cleft palate cases.

Patients from outstations were sent their earmoulds by registered post. 579 earmoulds were despatched. Due to non-availability of appropriate earmould rings, finished earmoulds could not be delivered to the patients immediately.

The earmould laboratory as in the previous year was also used for training purposes.

III. INSTRUMENTS:

The new instruments purchased during the year and the specific purpose for which they have been used are detailed below:

- 1. Electric Response Audiometer: This instrument is used for clinical evaluation. Our Institute is one of the few centres having an instrument of this kind Rs. 1,02,680-30
- 2. Oscilloscope: This instrument is being used along with the hearing science laboratory for demonstration of psychoacoustic phenomena Rs. 4,218/-

- 3. Digital multimeter and digital frequency counter both of these instruments are being used in the diagnostic room and for calibration of the audiometer Rs. 5, 250/-.
- 4. Telephone amplifier has been used for demonstration -Rs. 799/-.
- 5. Scientific calculators to be used for treatment of data Ps. 3,150/-.
- 6. Six new hearing aids for trial purpose and training programme Rs. 12,350/-.

IV. STAFF

V. EXTENSION SERVICES:

(a) School Screening/Speech and Hearing camps

Mr. P.J.Kumar and Mr. J.D. Samuel participated in six and five Speech and Hearing camps respectively.

Consultancy services for establishing speech and hearing clinic, sound treated rooms, earmould making, purchase of audiometers and hearing aids, auditory trainers and measuring instruments were provided to various institutions, service organisations and individuals.

VI. RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT:

- 1. Canal earmould were made at the earmould lab.
- 2. Earmoulds were prepared with cold acrylic materials.
- 3. A project on familiarity word list in spoken Kannada was prepared by Mr. P.J.Kumar and submitted for grant from the Ministry of Social Welfare, Government of India.
- 4. Flask locally made out of gunmetal for earmould lab was tried out and found satisfactory.
- 5. Various types of earmould rings received from outside and within the country were tried and a report was prepared regarding their suitability.

DEPARTMENT OF OTOLARYNGOLOGY

Narayana from K.R.Hospital performed the duties.

Dr. Shantha, Prof. of E.N.T. K R Hospital was appointed as visiting consultant to provide services on Wednesdays and Thursdays to cover the absence of departmental staff who would be attending the O.P.D. and O.T. respectively on those days at K.R.Hospital.

Dr.Rathnasabhapathy, Lecturer in Otolaryngology, continued to work in the Department.

III. DIAGNOSTIC AND SURGICAL SERVICES:

The Department continued to provide clinical/
medical services to the patients attending the Institute.

The collaboration with the local K.R.Hospital, continued with one out-patient day on Wednesday and two operation days on Thursday and Saturday. The cases needing specialised surgery registered at the Institute as on 31.1.1980 stood at 340, which requires additional days of operation and additional staff to clear the load.

Micro-otological operations such as Stapedectomy,
Myringoplasty, Tympanoplasty and Mixillo-facial surgeries
such as Palatoplasty and Pharyngoplasty were done this year

IV. EQUIPMENT:

Some more equipment like Electro-Nystagmograph in the diagnostic field, the Microlaryngeal and Micro-otological instruments in the curative aspects of disease have been procured for the department apart from the sophisticated anaesthetic equipment like Flutec Machine for the smooth induction of laryngeal surgery.

Additional new equipment like cryosurgical instruments were added to the department this year which will be
beneficial in preserving the normal physiological functions
in otorhinolaryngology. Steam sterlizer, bulk nitrous
oxide cylinders, stroz fiber optic oesophageal instruments

OFFICIAL LANGUAGE IMPLEMENTATION

Article 343 of the Constitution of India lays down that the official language of the Union shall be Hindi in Devanagari Script. Under Article 351 of the Constitution it shall be the duty of the Union to promote the spread of the Hindi language to develop it, so that it may serve as a medium of expression for all the elements of the composit culture of India and to secure its enrichment by assimilating.

According to Section 3(3)(i) of the Official Language Act 1963 (as amended in 1967 by the Official Language (Amendment) Act, 1967) both Hindi and English shall be used in resolutions/general orders, rules, notifications, administrative or other reports or press communiques issued or made by the Central Government or by a Ministry, Department or Company owned or controlled by the Central Government or by any office of such Corporation or Company.

In pursuance of the above provisions, the Institute is also using the official language Hindi. In addition, under the Hindi Teaching Scheme, imparting training in Hindi to the Centre Govt. employees is obligatory. Hindi classes were conducted in the Institute during 1981-82 and 29 members of the staff were deputed for training.

An Official Language Committee has also been constituted which met four times during the year and certain important decisions taken by the Committee were placed before the Official Language Town Implementation Committee and the meeting of all Liaison Officers of the city held under the auspicious of the Ministry of Flome Affairs on 12.2.1982. The Hindi Translator appointed by the Institute is attending to translation of circulars, forms and letters received from cases. During the year, Public Education Pamphlets were also translated and published in Hindi for the use of patients and visitors.

A library of Hindi books was also established in the office and the same is being used by the staff and the students.

DEPARTMENTAL CANTEEN

In accordance with the instructions issued by the Ministry of Home Affairs, 'A' type Tiffin Room was established in 1976 and has been functioning since then to cater the needs of the staff, students and cases visiting the Institute.

The Canteen has been functioning smoothly and render ring the required services. During the year under review, the Canteen has also undertaken dealership for hearing aids and had earned a profit of Rs.15,836.19. With the profit so earned, a Staff Welfare Fund was established and the entire profit earned through sale of hearing aids was transfered to the Staff Welfare Fund.

The Executive Council of the Institute has very kindly declared the employees of the Canteen as the exmployees of the Institute and the Executive Council has also been pleased to grant approval for introduction of CPF, Gratuity, Medical and Leave benefits to the employees of the Canteen.

STAFF WELFARE FUND

In order to promote the Welfare of the staff of the Institute a fund styled Staff Welfare Fund was constituted during December 1981, the source being the donations from the Departmental Canteen, interest on loans and nominal subscription from members.

The scheme among other things is envisaged.

- a) to grant a sum of Rs.1,000/- to the family of the staff member who dies while in service
- b) to provide monetary assistance to members of staff repayable in convenient instalments on a nominal interest, p.m.
- c) to provide text books, note books, pencils, erasers etc. free of cost to staff whose basic pay is upto Rs.350/- p.m.

CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETY

It was unanimously resolved in the staff meeting of the Institute to start a Co-operative Society at the Institute. To fulfil this task a Committee of promoters was formed from among the staff members with Mr M V Govindarajan as the Chief Promoters

The Society came into being with the sanction by the Asst. Registrar of Co-operative Societies vide Certificate of Registration No.ARM/PLN/RGN/5423/79-80 dated 5.4.1980.

The Society started functioning from 24th April 1980. It cattered the members and the Hostels with Food grains, Stationery, Cosmetics, Confectionery etc.

The main objective of the Society was to deal with Hearing Aids at Concessional rates to the cases. This was achieved during the month of April 1981 and within two months before the year end (June 1981) it could sell nearly 50 hearing aids.

The society managed to get the Cpvt. share as well as the managerial subsidy from the State Government of Karnataka.

By the end of June 1981, the Society had made a net profit of nearly 8.8500/-

The same Managing Committee is being continued, since
