

ANNUAL REPORT 1991-92

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AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India, established this Institute in the year 1965 as a department of Government of India to shoulder the responsibility of imparting professional training, rendering clinical services to the public with Speech and Hearing disorders and also conducting research in the field. Later the Institute was converted into an autonomous body and registered under the Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 (Punjab Amendment) Act 1957 as extended to the Union Territory of Delhi and since then functioning under the aegis of the Union Ministry of Health and Family Welfare. The University of Mysore accorder affiliation for teaching programme leading to the award of B.Sc., and M.Sc., and Ph.D., in Speech and hearing.

There are about 45 million people affiliated with Speech and Hearing problems in India. Tackling this problem is a gigantic effort which needs support and help from all quarters.

The Institute being only one of its kind in South East Asia, has to play a role in the new field of Speech and Hearing by adopting new matters through research done at the Institute by Specialists. It has to bring more number of qualified specialists viz., Speech Pathologists, Audiologists into the field by training.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of the Institute as enshrined in the Memorandum of Association are as follows:

Training:

- (a) To provide and assist in providing professional and technical education and training in Speech and Hearing for graduate, post-graduate and doctorate courses;
- (b) To provide and assist in providing professional and technical education and training to various categories of personnel eg., medical, para-medical etc.,
- (c) To undertake, organise and facilitate study courses, conferences, lectures, seminars, and the like to promote the above mentioned objectives;
- (d) To undertake and provide for publication of journals, research papers etc. and to establish and maintain libraries

- (e) To invite representatives of governments, universities and other organisations of India and of foreign countries to deliver lectures on subjects in which the Society is interest.
- (f) To cooperate with international agencies engaged in speech and hearing research and training and arrange for interchange of personnel, material and data;
- (g) To initiate, offer and grant prizes, awards and scholar ships, research grants and stipends in furtherance of the objectives of the Society;

Research:

(a) To provide and assist in providing facilities and encouragement to research in Speech and Hearing and associated disorders.

Clinical Services:

- (a) To provide and assist in providing clinical and surgical services for those with Speech and Hearing handicaps.
- (b) To assist in the development of Speech and Hearing Clinic in hospitals and other centres.

Public Education:

- (a) To educate the public about communicative disorders:
- (b) To stimulate interest in Speech and Hearing through publicity and mass communication and cooperate with other agencies and institutions or professional associations.

Administrative and Financial:

- (a) To create administrative, technical, ministerial and other posts under the Society and to make appointments there to in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Society;
- (b) To appoint and hire services or discharge/terminate the services of personnel and to pay them in return for the services wages, gratuities, provident funds and other allowances of remuneration in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Society;
- (c) To borrow and raise money and funds to further the objects of the Society and to raise or collect funds by

property either movable or immovable and to grant such rights and privileges to the donors, subscribers and other benefactors as the society may consider fit and proper;

- (d) To invest and deal with funds and money of the Society;
- (e) To subscribe to, or become a member of or to cooperate or malgamete with any other association or society whose object are similar;
- (f) To sell, assign, mortgage, lease, exchange and otherwise transfer or dispose of all or any property, movable or immovable of the Society for the furtherance of its objects or any of them, provided prior approval of the Central Government is obtained for the disposition of immovable property;
- (g) To negotiate and enter into contracts on behalf of the Society and vary and rescind such contracts:
- (h) To accept and undertake the management of any endowment or trust fund or donation to further the objects of the Society;
- (i) To establish a contributory provident funds and gratuity for the benefit of the employees of the Society;
- (j) To pay all costs, charges and expenses incurred in the promotion, formation, establishment and registration of the Society;
- (k) To do all such other lawful acts, deeds, things, either alone or in conjunction with other organisation or persons as the society may consider necessary, incidental or conductive to the attainment of the above mentioned objects or any of them;
- (1) To undertake any other function that may be assigned to the society by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (Department of Health) Government of India, in connection with Speech and Hearing.



HIGH LIGHTS - 1991-92: AN YEAR IN RETROSPECT

T. Visit of dignatories:

The main highlight of the year was the visit of the Chairman, Executive Council and the Hon'ble Union Minister of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India, Sri M L Fotedar to the Institute on the occasion of the valedictory of the Silver Jubilee celebrations of the Institute.

The Hon'ble Union Minister was gracious in consenting to lay the foundation stone for the extension of the Ladies Hosiel. Our heloved Chairman, along with the Vice-Chairman, Sr. G Puttaswamy Gowda, the Hon'ble Minister for Health and Family Welfare, Govt.of Karnataka went round the Institute and showed very keen interest in the activities of various departments.

On the same day, i.e., 5th October, the Hon'ble Minister of Health and Family Welfare, Sri M L Fotedar was the Chief Guest at a colourful function held at the Maharaja's College Centenary Hall marking the valedictory of the year long Silver Jubilee celebrations. Sri G Puttaswamy Gowda presided over the function.

Sri S M Krishna, Hon'ble Speaker of the Karnataka Legislative Assembly participated as the Chief Guest for the 26th Anniversay of the Institute.

II Meetings:

- (a) Review Committee Meeting: For the first time, the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare has set up Review Committees to review the working of the various institutions. The first Review Committee Meeting of the Institute was held in June 1991 followed by the second one in October 1991. In general, the activities of the Institute were appreciated by the members of the Committee and guidelines were given regarding the distribution of Grants allotted to the Institute.
- (b) The commendable feature of the year under report is that all the Committees i.e., Executive Council, Finance Sub-Committee and the Academic Sub-Committee met during the year to transact the business of the institute

- i) Modification of some of the bye-laws of the Institute so that the Institute activities can be conducted with greater ease and convenience and also in keeping pace with the changing trends;
- ii) Permission for conducting short-term courses and orientation programmes on payment of nominal charges;
- lii) Levy of charges:
 - levying of registration fee for the patients;
 - charge for issue of certificates;
 - library charges for external members
 - iv) Introduction of scholarship scheme instead of stipends to students.

INI Revenue and Expenditure:

Every effort was made to reduce the expenditure at the Institute. Notable among these were: the postage, telephone and in the use of vehicles. Wherever there was scope for generation of revenue, the sources were identified. Water meters were installed in the residential quarters and charges were collected as per the water meter reading instead of nominal charges as was collected previously. As a result, consumption-wastage of water has come down to a significant extent.

The efforts to generate additional revenue for the Institute were fruitful. Sources hitherto unconnected with AIISH such as KSIIDC and various banks come forward to denote generously and the Govt. of Karnataka made evailable the funds for printing public education pamphlets and for the febrication of the mobile unit for evaluation purposes.

Our attempts to reduce the discrepancy between the revenue and expenditure have been two-fold. On the one hand, an increase in the annual budget is anticipated and additional sources of revenue have been identified and the necessary sanctions for implementing the schemes are being obtained. Where the efforts could be fruitful, the expenditure has been pruned without effecting the activities qualitatively.

IV Service activities:

Erecking the barriers between the common man and the Ivory Tower of the dite, the Institute has taken the expertise and technology to the rural population by training the rural technicians in the repairs of the sophisticated electronic gadgets such as the hearing aids and in making ear moulds (an accessory used with hearing aids). For better understanding and management of the problems of the speech and hearing handicapped, a number of short-term training programmes have been planned for the parents, teachers and the industrialists.

The concern for the communicatively handicapped does not stop at providing professional services but extends to implementing several welfare measures. As in the previous years, financial assistance was given to the economically weaker section of the patients, from the Potients Welfare Fund.

To increase public awareness regarding speech and hearing problems and their prevention, slides have been prepared and screened in the cineme theatres in Mysore city. Audio and video cassettes are also being made available to patients and their guardians for better understanding of their problems of speech and hearing.

The Institute has joined hands with the voluntary organisations such as the Lions, the Rotary, the Inner Wheel, Round Table for community service and to involve the community itself for the welfare of the handicapped. Wheel chairs, special furniture for the cerebral palsied are some of the items donated through these agencies.

V Ecology and Environment:

The Institute has shown concern for its environment.

The Horticultural section of the Institute put up a grand show and won several prizes in various categories in the annual Dasara Horticultural Show. Besides maintaining an ornamental garden, the staff has intensified efforts in planting more trees and making fruits and vegetables available at competitive rates.

A new outlook has emerged through landscaping, extensive tree plantation and attention for cleanliness within and

that the work related to examinations, announcement of realts, admissions could be done with least inconvenience to the teachers and students.

The staff at various levels were given greater scope as well as responsibilities in achieving the objectives of the Institute. The Advisory Committees that were setup in the previous years were activated. The Committees met regularly and were of immense help in achieving the targets setforth for the year. Thus, the manpower resources available at the Institute was put to use to the fullest extent so that they not only contributed individually, but also worked well as a dedicated team. This was exemplified in the successful conduct of the various activities in connection with Silver Jubilee celebrations.

VII The Press and the Media:

The press and the media was very helpful in projecting a positive image of the Institute to the public as an institution concerned with the welfare of the handicapped.

Ample apportunities were provided to the speech and nearing impaired children to participate in the cultural activities, sports and games organised by the institute and by other agencies. Occasions such as the Anniversary Celebrations of the Institute and other national and international events such as the World Day of the Disabled; World Day of the Deaf; Teachers Day, Children's Day etc. The shows were a veritable feast for the ears and eyes. The 'All India' character of the institute comes to the fore especially on such occasions.

Cur students have not only attracted Youth Organisations to take up community service projects, but also they have actively participated in bland 2

for the inmates of oldage homes. They are also members of Youth organizations like the Rotaract, etc. It is inculcated in them that the wisdom that makes one wise is the wisdom to derve.

TRAINING PROGRAM

The main objectives of the Institute is to impart wromersional training and research facilities in the field of speech and hearing. It is affiliated to the University of Mysore for its training programme for awarding E.Co., M.Sc. and Ph.D degrees.

The training programme consists of 3 years Bachelor's degree and 2 years Master's degree in speech and hearing.

The subjects for study included are Speech Pathology, Speech Sciences, Audiology, Clinical Psychology, ENT and Electronics.

Involved in the training programme are full time staff of the Institute and part time staff from the Mysore Mysore. The subjects taught reflect the complexity of human communication and its disorder and the multidisciplinary nature of its diagnosis and treatment. Lectures and demonstrations by eminent scientists and scholars from both within and outside the country have enriched the training programme.

Resource material for our student trainees include books, periodicals, journals, audio-visual materials such as audio cassettes, slide-cum-tape programme, video cassettes, films which are available in the Library and Information Centre of the Institute. A full fledged clinic and well equipped laboratories provide ground for practical training, clinical services include comprehensive evaluation of the patients in several departments.

On approval of the Merit list by the Selection Committee constituted for the purpose which met on 5.7.1991 for B.C., and on 20.8.1992 for M.C., total number of students admitted to I B.Sc. and I M.Sc. (Speech and hearing) courses during 1991-92 were as follows:

No Activities:

As in the previous years, the NSC program was very popular with the students. During the year 1991-92, the following activities have been carried out under NSS program:

- 1. Similary Works: "Cleaning premises of Ladies and Gents Mostels were done twice during the year. Cleaning of Institute premises and preparation of Institute playgrounds were also carried out by NSS volunteers.
- 2. Blood Donation Campaign: Blood donation was done for 5 patients by NSS volunteers during the year.

Annty three Independent projects were completed and 22 re in progress. Wherever possible the staff have been arrived specific responsibilities in the following functional units.

Two of the staff members in the Departments are working for their doctoral degrees, entitled (i) CONTRIBUTOR FACTORS THE INTEGRATION OF HEARING-IMPAIRED CHILDREN IN REGULAR SCHOOL (Asha Yathiraj); (ii) DESCRIPTIVE STUDY OF THE SIGN LANGUAGE OF THE DEAF (K.Rajalakshmi).

Information on recent publications in the field was obtained.

Latert price list and catalogues of equipment related to the speech and hearing fields are procured to ensure regular acquisition of latest professional equipment for both diagnostic and rehabilitation purposes.

Diagnostic

i) Hearing Evaluation

All patients registered at the Institute are evaluated in the Department during initial as well as on subsequent visits. Cases who are eligible for receiving aid under the various schemes of both the Central and the State Covernment were issued necessary certificates for benefits such as pension, school admission, scholarship, employment, etc. Copies of the audiograms were given to the cases on request and appropriate referrals were made whenever required.

enable instruments used for hearing evaluation are enforcially calibrated to ensure that they work as per exactications.

Antiants seen in the Department were in the following categories:

- (1) those coming for initial and periodic hearing evaluation/reevaluation.
- (2) Those who are seen for pre and post-medical/surgical etaluation.
- (3) Those with a predominant speech disorders, mental retardation, tinnitus or vertigo for whom hearing evaluation is also done as a routine.
- (4) Those who need certificates to receive pension/tax exemption/housing scheme/admission to deaf school/ language exepmtion/education scholarship/employment that they are eligible for.

A comprehensive hearing evaluation was done for all cases using the following instruments. These instruments were also employed for research purposes.

- (1) Diagnostic audiometers (C3-10; GS-16; Arphi Digital 900; Danplex A367; AS72; Clinical audiometer Madsen CB 822).
- (2) Immittance audiometers (Madsen Z377 MB and ZO 174).
- (3) ERA (Teledyne Avionics TA-1000; Nicolet Compact Auditory System).

ii) Hearing Aid Trial:

Hearing aid selection for patients is made from the array of models that are available for trial at the Department. The following types of hearing aids are being used for trial purpose (1) body level (2) Spectacle type AC/BC and (3) behind-the-ear.

Functional gain measurements and/or insertion gain measurements were used to select the appropriate hearing aid for an individual. Insertion gain measurements have been useful especially when fitting individuals with high frequency hearing losses, and to check the efficiency of earmold modifications such as venting, varying the canallance, bore diameter, use of dampers, etc.

Mearing aid testing has been carried-out for patients who came from a wide range of background including its rates and illiterates, individuals from rural as well urban areas, individuals belonging to different sociococciococciococcio starus; different age groups, both male and finally. Prescriptions were given to those individuals for show hearing aids were found useful.

ounselled regarding speech reading, auditory training, and were demonstrated the use of hearing aids. Tips on maintenance and double shooting the hearing aids were also given to patients.

The patients who use the telephone were given practice in actual use of the hearing aid with a telephone. For training, the telephones available in the Institute premises were made use of.

Hearing aid manufacturers periodically replaced the hearing aids supplied by them for trial purposes. Electro-acoustic measurements were made periodically for all hearing aids which are available for trial purposes.

In addition to the above, the Hearing Aid Trial Section was also engaged in

- Periodic checking of the hearing aids, calibration and maintenance of other instruments.
- 2. Recommendation of assistive listening devices and ear protective devices.
- 3. Issue of certificates to get the driving license.
- 4. Issue of certificates of hearing aid benefit for employment purposes.
- 5. Issue of medical reimbursement forms.

iii) Earmould Lab:

Custom made earmoulds are necessary for all those waar a hearing aid. So, as a routine the cases who were advised to wear a hearing aid were directed to the earmold lib to give their ear impressions. A regular mould is usually worn along with almost all types of body level hearing aids. Lifferent types of moulds, such as full

Swimmes earmoulds were also made for a few individuals. Different types of modifications such as replacement of tube, shortening the canal portion etc. were made wherever indicated.

iv) Therapy activities:

Guidance regarding speech reading, auditory training was given to parents/patients attending speech therapy at the Institute and to those who train their children at home.

v) Counselling:

All the patients who have been prescribed hearing aids were counselled regarding the use, care and maintenance of hearing aids and earmoulds.

Patients were also couselled regarding followup. visits, use of ear protective devices, continued exposure to loud noise, educational placement of the hearing-impaired child.

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DEPARTMENT OF SPEECH PATHOLOGY

The Department of Speech Pathology, besides providing theoretical and practical training in speech and language disorders to undergraduate and postgraduate students, was instrumental in rendering clinical services, both diagnostics and therapeutic.

CLINICAL ACTIVITIES:

<u>Diagnostics</u> and <u>Counselling Section</u>: Statistics are presented in Table VIII.

Prosthedontic Aids:

The Prosthodontic Technician has prepared cleft palate prostheses and speech bulbs for the cases referred by the Plastic Surgeon and Speech Pathologists. Both temporary and long term prostheses are prepared with a monthly follow up. Statistics are presented at Table IX.

Steady models for teaching purposes have also been prepared. In the absence of a full fledged Prosthodontic Lab the work is currently being carried out in the EarMold Lab of the Institute.

THERAPY CLINIC

TRAINING:

Regular clinical training is being provided to 84 undergraduat; and 44 postgraduate students in Speech and Hearing in handling a variety of speech-language and hearing disordered individuals. This is done through observation, diary writing and practical clinical training in pretherapy assessment, planning and carrying out therapy, couselling and guida ce for home training and report writing.

Fifty percent of the students in each class are posted in the clinic at a time for 3 hours/day on rotation.

THERAPEUTIC SERVICES:

Clients of all age groups with a variety of speechlanguage and hearing disorders were provided with speechlanguage therapy throughout the year. The details are On an average 172 cases with various speech disorders were seen and an average of 1698 individual therapy sessions of 45-60 minute duration were provided to these cases. A group of 8-10 hard of hearing children were provided intensive group therapy for 90 minutes per day to improve their auditory and communicative skills.

on an average, 20-25 out-station cases were seen every menth for demonstration of speech therapy. They were provided in tensive guidance/demonstration sessions and handouts for home training on auditory training, articulation correction and speech and language training.

Materials Development:

- (a) Correspondence therapy lessons for misarticulation cases in Kannada and English are being used regularly with demonstration therapy cases. Malcolm Fraser's Self therapy for stutterers in English and its Kannada version are being used with abult stutterers. Kannada versions of the John Tracy lessons are being given to parents of hard of hearing children for home training. Audio cassettes for auditory training and nursery rhyme cassettes are regularly used in therapy.
- (b) (1) Two cassettes on speech stimulation have been prepared in Kannada and English for student training and parent guidance describing various techniques for speech stimulation.
- (2) Audio cassettes on sound effects have been prepared densisting of various types of sound (animals sounds, vehicle sounds, household sounds, environmental sounds, musical sounds, etc.) along with pictures for auditory awareness and discrimination training.

- (3) Charts and flash cards have been prepared for regular language therapy and concept teaching.
- (4) UNICEF project on "Production of Language Training Material in major Indian Languages" is in progress.
- (5) Video recording of speech and language disorders for public education and student training is in progress.

OTHER ACTIVITIES:

The children receiving speech therapy participated in the cultural programes on the occasion of the 26th Anniversary of the Institute on 9.8.91.

Children's Day on 14.11.1991 was celebrated with a large number of children taking part in the fancy dress competition. Prizes were distributed and refreshments were served.

The World Disabled Day on 18.3.1992 was co-hosted by Mysore Round Table-21 and Ladies Circle-9. On this occasion, sports meet for the disabled children was held and prizes were distributed. MRT-21 donated special furniture for the use of cerebral palsied children at AIISH. Tricycles for the adult physically disabled persons was also donated jointly by the Theosophical Order of Service, MRT-21 and Ladies Circle-9. Mr.Goutham R Shetty, Chairman, MRT-21 was the Chief Guest.

Itinerant Speech Therapy Activities:

Follow-up

a) Correspondence

Follow up letters were sent to the Therapy cases and their wards, there they are irregular for therapy and also when specific information regarding therapy needs to be conveyed.

During this year, 188 followup letters were set which shows that majority of cases were regular for therapy. cases replied for enquiry stating personal

61 cases reported to the Clinic in response to the follow letters and 11 letters were returned due to change in address.

b) School visits

Majority of therapy cases who have speech, hearing and language problems were senrolled in normal schools within the city. Such schools were being visited regularly, to collect information on their academic performances, difficulties sacad by the concerned teachers in the classroom and social behaviour/adjustments of these children. 17 to 20 hearing impaired, 5 with Dyslexia, 3 with stuttering, 30 with M.L. and 3 with delayed speech and language were followed up in each school were given guidance on classroom management and also, guidelines on identification, prevention and referral.

Two special schools were also visited during the year -one for Mentally Retarded and another for Deaf Children. Guidance and orientation to the staff was provided besides follow up of few children who were enrolled for therapy at AILSH Clinic.

Parent Guidance Programme

Parent Guidance Programmes were being held regularly, providing guidance on home training, follow up of therapy, educational and vocational management. Demonstration services were also held wherever necessary. 30 sessions of 2 hours duration were conducted during this year.

Guidance was given to the parents of Mentally Retarded and Cerebral Palsied children with regard to their association activities, mainly dealing with overall rehabilitation of such children.

DEPARTMENT OF SPEECH SCIENCES

CLINICAL SERVICES:

755 patients have been evaluated and therapy for different speech and language disorders have been provided. Computer was extensively used this year for the diagnosis of vair., fluency and articulation disorders. New method of evaluating stuttering using fluency norms has been developed and used for clinical evaluation of stuttering.

DELEGINARY OF CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY

CLINICAL SERVICES:

Disgnostics: A total number of 2438 cases were tested and evaluated for routine and special diagnostics which included neuropsychological assessment and evaluations and vocational assessment, interests, aptitudes etc.

Therapeutics: Individual therapy was given to persons with stuttering, mental retardation, infantile autism, behavioural problem, functional voice disorders and other speech and hearing problems.

Therapeutic interventions included are behaviour modification, behaviour therapy, bio-feedback, progressive muscular relaxation, hypnotherapy, psychodrama and behaviour counselling. Group therapy programme were also given for mentally retarded and stutterers.

A total number of 113 cases received therapy during the year.

A total number of 1453 therapy sessions were spent for treatment.

Parent/Party counselling and guidance:

The parents of the mentally retarded and other cases with behaviour problems were counselled regarding the management of problematic behaviours, improving self help skills etc. Behavioural counselling was carried out with cases like stuttering, voice disorders, aphasics, learning disabilities etc. Vocational guidance was also carried out by the staff for cases with hearing handicapped and mentally retarded.

- 2. Therapeutic: At present, only minimal therapeutic procedures like clearing of discharging ears are being done at the Institute. Other therapeutic procedures, both medical and surgical are being done at K R Hospital.
- 3. Research Activities: Homeopathic and Ayurvedic Vs. Allopathic treatment in CSOM, SOM, Post-operative cases was undertaken. Clinical Chemical cautrization for small central perforation (Silver Nitrate).

Proforma prepared in bilingual form i.e. Hindi and English was used in connection with the above.

The Department of Electronics, besides providing theoretical and practical training in Electronics and accustics to the under-graduate and post-graduate students, was instrumental in giving the necessary technical information in the Eurohase of new equipment for the Institute and in having a comprehensive programme for the maintenance of all electrical and electronic equipment, calibration of testing instrument in all the Departments in the Institute.

Hearing aids of all types brought by the patients were repaired/serviced, sometimes replacing the damaged parts. The hearing aids distributed under the "Aids and Aphliacnes Scheme," of the Ministry of Welfare were tested and certified.

Besides the equipment within the institute, the Central Air Conditioning Unit, Generators and Pump House are maintained. Arrangements were also made for the use of Audio-visual equipment whenever these were required for Guest Lectures, Clinical Conference and Journal Club. Statistics are indicated in Table VI.

1. Construction of Speech Block:

Administrative approval was accorded by the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare for the above work. The estimate was technically scrutinised by the Chief Engineer Communication and Buildings (South) Bangalore during December 88 for Rs. 32.73 lakhs outlay on the work to the er of 31.3.92 is Rs. 29.50 lakhs. The Civil work and Electrica works have almost been completed, except for providing front door and power supply to the Building.

2. Construction of first floor over the ground floor of the present Ladies Hostel:

The estimate for the above work was recasted and submitted for scrutiny to the Chief Engineer, C&B (South) Bangalore and the same is received back duly scrutinised for Rs.21.50 lakhs through the Superintending Engineer, Mysore Circle, Mysore in letter No.14740 dated 30.3.1992. The Administrative approval for the same is not yet received. In the meanwhile preparation of tender schedule for the above work is received telegraphically from the Chairman of Executive Council during January 1992. Foundation stone for this work was laid by Sri M.S.Fotedar Hon'ble Minister of Health & Family Welfare, Government of India 5.10.91. Formal administrative approval is awaited.

3. Maintenance of campus buildings:

In addition to the above works, the Engineering Section is also attending to the maintenance and other repair works of all the buildings in the campus.

 - Slogans regarding speech and hearing problems were prepared.

 The same were made into slides which are being screened into cinema threatres.
 - Mrs CS Vanaja delivered a lecture on Assessment of Hearing to 25 teachers at Regional College of Education, Mysore.

clides on hearing impairment and video cassette on Ear and Hearing were prepared to develop audio-visual resource material for the hearing impaired and their families.

2) Help-the-aged with communication disorders - A project supported by Helpage, U.K. at a cost of Rs.6.95 lakhs.

Audiological evaluation was carried out for approximately 120 patients every month. A clinical audiometer, immittance audiometer and evoked response audiometry were used to find out severity and type of hearing loss. Hearing aid trial was carried out to recommend suitable hearing aids when required.

3) Better molds for more people - A proposal for up-grading earmold technology. Under the scheme of Science & Technology project in Mission Mode on "Application of Technology for the Welfare and Rehabilitation of the Handicapped" at a cost of Rs.36.22 lakhs.

The feasibility of using the indigenously available materials for making soft earmolds is being tried. Metal flasks are being fabricated. Ring fixing to some soft earmolds is successful. Metal rings were designed and fabricated. These are found suitable for our requirements. Electroacoustic evaluation of hearing aids with different earmold options was carried out.


