Communication is the essence of life. Speech, Language and Hearing are involved rigorously in any communication around us. Those deprived of these abilities in whatever form are at a loss affecting their life both quantitatively and qualitatively. The All India Institute of Speech and Hearing (AIISH) has been striving to promote effective communication by one and all. The multidisciplinary and well coordinated team at AIISH has been providing services, training man power, conducting research besides implementing strategies for public education on communication disorders focusing on their prevention, identification, assessment and management.

The All India Institute of Speech and Hearing that was established on the 9th of August 1965 is a premier institution in the country focused on communication and its disorders. In the last 44 years, the institute has grown from its infancy to adulthood in form as well as function. The vision of the institute is met with some of the major objectives of AIISH which include:

- Manpower generation in the field of speech, language and hearing.
- Conducting research both in the areas of basic sciences of speech, language and hearing as well as in the areas of its application for effective communication.
- Providing clinical services to persons with communication disorders along with developing modules for providing services at different levels in the society.
- Striving towards implementing strategies for prevention (be it primary, secondary, tertiary) of communication disorders.
- Public education towards identifying communication disorders in the community.
- Development of materials for better public awareness and education on or about communication disorders in their prevention and management.

Highlights of the year 2008-09

• Proposal for upgradation of AIISH as a Super Specialty Center of Excellence

Although the field of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology as a profession has its roots in other medical and non medical fields, it has grown as an independent profession. The professionals qualified as Speech-Language Pathologists and Audiologists are involved in the rehabilitation of individuals with communication disorders (hearing, speech and language disorders). Successful delivery of services to persons with communication disorders is however a multidisciplinary issue. The country needs qualified and trained manpower in this multidisciplinary amalgamation in different tiers to cater to specific needs of persons with communication disorders of all ages.

There are more than 43 institutions in the country which are actively involved in the generation of trained manpower in the field of communication disorders, offering courses varying from certificate level courses to doctoral degrees. Yet, it has remained evidently insufficient when it comes to the issue of addressing the thrust areas and needs of persons with communication disorders. The reasons from amongst the major ones include *brain drain, inadequate number of trained professionals within the country, high concentration in urban areas resulting in very little or poor representation in the rural areas and other factors.*

There is scarcity of master trainers (teachers) to train manpower in India. In the last 44 years, the institute has trained around 2435 manpower in the area of speech, language and hearing. Of these, 753 are post-graduate students and 44 are Ph.Ds.

Hence the institute submitted a proposal for the "Up-gradation of the All India Institute of Speech & Hearing as a *Super Specialty Centre of Excellence*" to create a variety of manpower to cater to the needs of persons with communication disorders, utilizing all possible modes of education and training to the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India. This proposal was developed considering the recommendations of several stakeholders of the institute, namely the multidisciplinary professionals dealing with communications disorders; the NGOs; the beneficiaries of the institute; and the Alumni of AIISH, obtained through a series of brainstorming meetings held for the purpose.

Ministry of Health & Family Welfare constituted a committee to examine the feasibility of upgradation of AIISH. The committee chaired by Dr. R. K. Srivastava, DGHS, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare that met on 27th June 2008 reviewed the activities of AIISH and recommended submission of a detailed proposal approving the background papers prepared by the institute.

Based on the background papers prepared and suggestions of the committees, a proposal for upgradation of the AIISH, Mysore was prepared and submitted. The Ministry is now looking into this proposal.

• Implementation of 'Oversight Committee' recommendations of OBC reservations

Consequent to Supreme Court judgment and as per the directions issued by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India for implementation of 27% reservation to OBC candidates in the admission to professional courses run by the institutions, action has been initiated to provide reservation to the students belonging to OBC category for the academic year 2008-09. The seats for each course conducted at the institute were increased to accommodate this reservation. Accordingly, 9 students in undergraduate (UG) and 18 students in Postgraduate (PG) (9 Audiology & 9 Speech-Language Pathology respectively) were given admission in the reporting academic year.

A proposal to create additional faculty and technical staff along with additional infrastructure was submitted to Ministry of Health and Family Welfare for consideration.

• Proposal for 'Deemed to be university' status to UGC

A detailed proposal for 'Deemed to be university' status to the institute was prepared and submitted to the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare for approval and recommendations. The same was forwarded by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare to the Ministry of Human Resource Development by the Ministry itself, which in turn has forwarded to UGC for the needful.

• The 52nd Executive Council of the institute approved the following:

- a. Thirty six seats each in M.Sc (Audiology) and M.Sc (SLP) with stipulated proportion of reservations.
- b. Enhancement of Junior Research Fellowship to be at par with that of assistantships given to full time Ph.D students at IITs.
- c. The post-doctoral fellowship to be at 25% over and above the Junior Research Fellowship.
- d. The Non-faculty members to register for Ph.D.
- e. Accept the donation amount from the "Friends" United Organization Endowment Scholarship to stipulated category of student every year.

ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

In line with the objective of the institute to generate manpower, the institute conducted 13 long term training programs. Theoretical, practical and clinical training was imparted to the trainees using state-of-the-art technology by a highly qualified team of staff.

New Academic Programs

• Launch of two PG diploma programs

P.G. Diploma in Forensic Speech Sciences and Technology and P.G. Diploma in Clinical Linguistics for Speech-Language Pathologists were launched with the affiliation University of Mysore. P.G. Diploma in Forensic Speech Sciences and Technology intends to train professionals in the area of speaker identification which would be



applicable in forensic sciences. This credit based self financed trimester program was initiated with two students. The P.G. Diploma in Clinical Linguistics for Speech-Language Pathologists intends to equip the speech-language pathologists to assess, diagnose, plan intervention and conduct research programs for communication disorders in the Indian language context. Though

to

it was launched it could not be initiated because there were no student takers. These are the first courses of their kind in India.

• Diploma in Hearing, Language and Speech: Launch of six additional study centers

To hasten the rate of manpower development in the area of Speech and Hearing and to support the National Program of Prevention and Control of Deafness (NPPCD) of Government of India in the country, **The Diploma in Hearing Language and Speech** (**DHLS**) (through distance mode) was conceived in the year 2007-08 with five



study centers at Mysore, Delhi, Puducherry, Mumbai and Imphal. In the year 2008-09 the program was further expanded by starting 6 additional study centers viz. at Indira Gandhi Medical College, **Shimla**, Chathrapati Sahuji Maharaj Medical University, **Lucknow**, Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College, **Ajmer**, Rajasthan, S.C.B. Medical College, **Cuttack**, Orissa, Rajendra Medical Sciences, **Ranchi**, Jharkhand and N.S.C.B Medical College, **Jabalpur**, Madhya Pradesh, thus totaling it to eleven study centers. The plan to impart the theory part of the program through terrestrial linked videoconferencing facility from AIISH, Mysore and to impart clinical training at the eleven study centers which was approved both by the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare as well as by RCI was implemented smoothly for the second year as well. A total of 211 students enrolled in these centers.

• Diploma in Teaching the Young Hearing Impaired (DTYHI)

This program which was launched in the reporting year is approved by the RCI. This diploma program helps in generation of manpower which will cater to the needs of children with hearing impairment below 3 years of age and their caregivers. The students will be provided with in-depth theoretical knowledge and hands on skill training for the identification and basic

rehabilitation of the communicatively handicapped. The report year had eight admissions for this course.

New admissions

• Graduate and Post graduate program

B.Sc (Speech and Hearing) continued to be the well sought after professional program in the country. Around 418 applications were received from students from various parts of India and abroad. National level entrance examinations were conducted for admission to B.Sc (Speech and Hearing), M.Sc (Speech-Language Pathology) and M.Sc (Audiology) programs. 247 students appeared for the B.Sc (Speech and Hearing) entrance examination conducted at Delhi, Kolkata, Guwahati, Mumbai, Chennai and Mysore. The entrance examinations for M.Sc were conducted at Mysore and 155 & 147 students appeared for M.Sc Speech-Language Pathology & Audiology entrance examinations, respectively. The institute received 349 applications and succeeded in filling up 100% seats in M.Sc (Speech-Language Pathology) and M.Sc (Audiology). However, the enrollment in M.S.Ed (HI) and Diploma in Hearing Aid and Ear mould Technology was rather poor, with 5 and 4 of the 20 seats respectively. 27% OBC reservation was implemented in the current year filling up a total of an additional 27 seats in UG and PG courses.

• Doctoral program

Seven doctoral students were awarded the doctoral degree. Three students submitted their thesis for award of degree. Two new students were awarded Junior Research Fellowship to pursue Ph.D. In total, there were 13 full time junior research fellows (JRFs) and one part time doctoral candidate, who were pursuing their Ph.D at the institute in the report year.



• Post Doctoral Program

To meet the demands for research in the field of speech, language and hearing, the institute introduced two Post-Doctoral Fellowships in the area of speech, language and hearing from the year 2007-08. Though it did not have any takers last year, this fellowship is open to all those who have required qualification and flair for research in the area of speech, language and hearing.

Other Programs

 Certificate Course for Caregivers of Children with Developmental Communication Disabilities (C4D2) was launched in the year 2007–08 and 5 batches of caregivers (95 students) completed the C4D2 course which the study material was



for

developed. During the year, two contact programs were conducted for parent participants.

• Launch of a New Department

The new department of *Centre Rehabilitation Education through Distance Mode (CREDM)* was inaugurated by Anbumani Ramdoss, Hon'ble Union Minister for Health and Family Welfare on 5th Jan 2009. This department seeks to reach clinical and supportive services



those who cannot come to Mysore. E-learning packages covering all types of communication disorders and live demonstrations of assessment and intervention techniques for the caregivers / clients with communication disorders is being prepared.

- Prof. Asha Yathiraj, HOD-Audiology, AIISH conducted a part of the Continuing Education Program (CEP) on 'Central Auditory Processing Disorders' at the 41st ISHACON 2009 at Pune (Indian Speech and Hearing Association conference).
- Prof. R. Manjula, HOD-POCD and Dr. P. Manjula, Reader-Audiology visited Disabilities Studies Department, Faculty of Medicine, University of Kelaniya, Colombo, Sri Lanka as examiners and to develop curriculum for the speech and hearing course there.
- Prof. Shyamala, K.C HOD-DMD conducted a course on 'Bilingual Aphasia' for European Masters program in Clinical Linguistics (EMCL) program from May to July 2008 at Potsdam, Germany.

Short Term Training Programs

The institute continued to offer short term training programs for speech, language and hearing as well as allied professionals and target groups. **Twenty five** such programs were organized in the reporting year targeting speech, language and hearing professionals, clinical psychologists, ENT specialists, and special educators. Some of the areas covered were diagnostic and therapeutic procedures, acoustic measurement, instrumentation in speech-language sciences, clinical counseling and cognitive behavior therapy.

Staff enrichment and sensitization programs were conducted on 10 topics through 25 sessions by the Department of special education throughout May 2008. A 3 day short term training program was held for enrichment of knowledge and skills among 13 diploma students in special education and 10 special educators in special schools at Mysore.

In addition to this, several national and international guest faculties, representing institutes and universities far and wide delivered guest lectures on upcoming topics and topics of current interest. The below mentioned are a few of them:

Seminars / Conferences / Workshops

Apart from conducting several in-house training programs to train diploma, undergraduate and postgraduate students, around 25 workshops and 2 seminars were conducted by different departments of the institute.

The institute continued to encourage its faculty and staff to update their knowledge by deputing them to attend workshops/seminars. The faculty and staff of the institute attended 39 workshops conducted by other organizations and 27 workshops/seminars/conferences conducted by AIISH. To mention a few:

- Department of CREDM conducted a workshop on "Feasible Models of early intervention in children with Hearing Impairment (Brainstorming Session)" on 25th April 2008.
- Department of Special Education conducted a workshop on "Facilitating Inclusive Education for Children with Hearing Impairment" from 30th June to 4th July 2008.



- Department of ENT conducted a workshop on "Reversible Hearing Impairment in children" on 23rd July 2008.
- Department of Speech-Language Pathology conducted a Seminar on "Perspectives in children with Down's syndrome" on 10th November 2008.
- Department of Speech-Language Sciences and Clinical Services conducted a workshop on "Speech Intelligibility" from 15th to 19th December 2008.
- Department of Speech-Language Pathology conducted a workshop on "Child Language Disorders" on 17th December 2008.
- Department of Speech-Language Sciences conducted a National Workshop on "Phonetic Perception" on 19th and 20th February 2009.
- AIISH coordinated a workshop on "Role and responsibilities of RCI in implementation of UNCRPD provisions on 24th and 25th Feb. 2009. The above meet, conducted behalf of RCI, aimed at determining whether the BASLP and MASLP courses had implemented the provisions of the UNCRPD. The



course coordinators from 43 different institutions running BASLP and MASLP courses were invited to participate in the two day program. The provisions of the UNCRPD that already existing in the syllabi were discussed. In addition, the modifications to be made in the syllabus were recommended. Prof. Asha Yathiraj was the coordinator for the program.

PARTICIPATION IN NATIONAL PROGRAM FOR PREVENTION AND CONTROL OF DEAFNESS (NPPCD)

AIISH being the Nodal Center for manpower development for implementation of National Program for Prevention and Control of Deafness (NPPCD), participated in all activities of NPPCD.

- B.Sc. (Speech and Hearing) interns of AIISH were placed in the districts all over India where NPPCD is implemented. This included Mandya, Hassan, Hubli, Lucknow, Haridwar, Vellore, Puducherry, Cuttack, Guwahati, Mumbai and Jabalpur.
- AIISH provided technical specifications for Audiological equipment and hearing aids.
- AIISH tendered for Behind the Ear (BTE) Hearing aids to be distributed under NPPCD and completed the process of rate contract finalization. It also



developed the guidelines for the selection and distribution of BTE Hearing aids which is now used all over the country by individuals with hearing impairment.

LIBRARY AND INFORMATION CENTRE

The AIISH library and information centre is an outstanding learning resource centre and is the best specialized libraries in the country in the field of speech, language and hearing. It provides appropriate knowledge resources to meet the information needs of the academic community of the institute by providing the most modern resources and value added information services in the area of speech, language and hearing. It caters to the students, faculty, researchers of the institute, elite professionals, educational institutions and other authorized users in the related discipline of speech, language and hearing from different parts of the country.

The collection of the library which includes books, journals, theses, dissertations, departmental projects, independent projects and other non-book material is regarded one of the richest collections in the country, in the field of Audiology, Speech Language Pathology, Speech Language Sciences, Special Education and allied fields.

529 books were added during the year bringing the collection up to 16,275 volumes in the reporting year. 68 journals and 40 e-journals were subscribed. All together, a sum of Rs. 27,65,586/- was spent to procure these books and journals.

The digitalization process of the library which commenced in the beginning of the reporting year is nearing completion. In-house publication like Masters dissertations, Doctoral theses and independent projects are converted from print format to digital format. Through Electronic Resources in Medicine (ERMED) consortium, AIISH is getting online access to journals in the National Medical Library. More computers were added with the increase in broadband. Library portal is under development in the reporting year.

RESEARCH ACTIVITIES

The institute has been a forerunner in conducting innovative research in the domains of speech, language, hearing and their disorders. The research projects are undertaken by the

institute with extra mural fund as well as AIISH Research Fund. In the reporting year, 7 Extramural funding research projects, 13 AIISH Research Fund projects and 6 departmental research projects were underway while eight research projects as well as 2 in-house programs were completed.

As an outcome of the research undertaken, there were several research publications which saw the light of the day. In the reporting year, the faculty had to their credit, 142 publications. These included 7 international publications, 25 national publications, 90 internal publications and 7 books and 4 chapters in books. CLINICAL SERVICES

The institute offers a wide range of clinical services to persons with communication disorders, their family and professionals. The Department of Clinical Services is one of its kind

in the country. A team of speech, language, hearing and allied medical and non-medical professionals cater to clients under one roof. Apart from the core services in the area of speechlanguage pathology and audiology, services of allied professionals such as otolaryngologists, pediatrician,



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neurologist, plastic surgeon, prosthodontist, phonosurgeon, clinical psychologist, physiotherapist and occupational therapists etc., are also available in the department. In the reporting year, a total of 40,719 clients were attended to, in the clinic. 17276 new clients were registered, 23443 follow up clients were evaluated and 21205 individual therapy sessions were conducted. The institute runs Specialty Clinics to attend to the needs of clients with special disorders. This includes the Listening Training Unit under the Department of Audiology; Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) Unit, Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Unit and Craniofacial Unit under the Department of Speech-Language Pathology; Professional Voice Care Center and Forensic Voice Unit dealing with the analysis related to speaker identification under the Department of Speech-Language Sciences.

A high-tech CCTV which was installed in the year 2007-08, covering 96 rooms with eight monitor stations was used for active monitoring of therapy sessions of clients. Each room is fitted with a CCTV camera and microphone to facilitate live two way audio interaction and one way video interaction between both the student supervisor and the student clinician. This enables the supervisors to modify the activities and techniques adopted by the student therapist whenever indicated. This enhanced the quantum of supervision provided. Individual as well as group therapy were provided depending upon the needs of the clients.

The institute started dispensing hearing aids of all styles and makes at subsidized rates since December 2006. This scheme has been ensuring the quality of the hearing aid dispensed and has also made the process of procurement of hearing aids hassle free to the clients. In the reporting year, 1059 hearing aids of over twelve makes and models including Behind The Ear (BTE) type, In The Ear (ITE) type, Completely-In-the Canal (CIC) types were dispensed under this scheme.

The following programs in addition to the diagnostic and therapeutic services were rendered:

International Stuttering Awareness Day celebrated on 14th November 2008. program included orientation lectures stuttering, its signs and symptoms, psychological and fluency management stuttering. An exhibition and various competitions were held for the participants following by group discussion.



 Commemoration of the 22nd World Disabled Day on 3rd December 2008 coordinated by the Department of Special Education. Two parents of children with special needs children: Latha Murthy, Secretary, Swasahaya Samuchaaya and Ms. Vanishree Basavaraj were invited as Chief Guest



Guest of Honour, respectively. Around 550 spectators including clients, caregivers and staff attended the programme. Cultural programmes were presented by AIISH clients and caregivers.

Department of Special Education

Preschool Activities

The Department of Special Education provides clinical and educational services to children with different kinds of communication disorders under preschool training program. This program aims at promoting all round development in these



children and preparing them with skills necessary for later schooling and integration. The training programmes comprise of essential skills like language, listening, cognitive, self-help, and pre-academics among others. It includes the group comprising of children with hearing impairment, mental retardation and autism in four different language groups i.e., Kannada, Hindi, Malayalam and English. In the report year, 165 children were enrolled in 21 groups of preschool catering to children with hearing impairment, mental retardation, autism and other multiple disabilities. These children attended the preschool every day for four hours. The month wise statistics is given below:

In addition to the regular activities, the preschool was active in conducting the following programs:

Organisation of Camps formed an integral part of the co-curricular activities of the preschool. These camps endeavour to add to holistic development in children with special needs as well as enrich the latent talents of caregivers. The following camps were held during the year April 2008 and March 2009:

Summer Camp was held during the summer vacation from 1st to 31st May 2008, which involved activities such as Yoga & Physical Exercise, Arts and Crafts, Dance & Music and Games for the children. As part of



Summer Camp, a field visit was organised for the children to Mysore Milk Diary and Natural Science Museum. Activities like making nutritious snacks and talent show were organised for parents. Reverse integration including typically developing children along with the children with special needs was the highlight of this programme.

Dasara Camp was held during the Dasara vacation from 29th September to 12th October 2008 which included activities such as Yoga & Physical Exercise, Arts and Crafts, Dance & Music. A visit to the Mysore zoo and *Gombe Mane* (doll house) *was* also organised as part of the camp activities.



Best Caregiver Award is given away periodically to encourage caregivers participation and involvement in the children's education as well as preschool activities. The following awards were given away in the current year:

EXTENSION SERVICES



The Department of Prevention of Communication Disorders (POCD) was initiated as a part of plan activity of the institute in January 2008. The institute continued with its activities of prevention of deafness and hearing impairment and prevention of communication disorders. Under the infant screening program infants were screened for hearing loss, in 11 hospitals in Mysore. On an average 13570 children were screened at extension services, 236 children in schools and 21 were referred to AIISH for the assessment of hearing loss. Those who failed the screening test were referred for detailed evaluation at the institute to ascertain hearing loss and to provide the required intervention.

Camps: Periodically AIISH conducts outstation camps on requests by NGO's usually to rural and remote areas where professional help is not easily available. Multidisciplinary team visits the place, conducts the screening for speech and hearing disorders and also provides rehabilitation services such as dispensing of hearing aid, counseling on listening training, home training etc. 25 camps were held in the reporting year in different districts of Karnataka, Kerala and Tamil Nadu. The details of the camps are given in the table below:

PUBLIC LECTURE SERIES

AIISH continued "Monthly Public Lecture Series" program with the objective of reaching the unreached. The main purpose of this program is to create awareness in the public on various communication disorders. In this program, experts in the field of communication disorders deliver one-hour lecture (on topics



such as stuttering, articulation disorders, autism, aphasia, mental retardation, hearing

problems, ENT problems, voice problems, etc.) followed by question and answer sessions with the public on the last Saturday of every month. Twelve lectures covering the topics of hearing problems in children, management of behaviour problems, aphasia- identification and management, cochlear implant - a promising surgical procedure for the hearing impaired, hearing problems in senior citizens, cleft lip and palate: cause & management, benefits & concessions for persons with disability, importance of listening in the development of speech and language, autism: causes, characteristics, diagnosis and intervention, learning disability-identification and management and misarticulation: causes and remediation have been delivered so far as part of the program in the report year.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The students enrolled in various programs of AIISH got an excellent opportunity for their overall development during their tenure at the institute. Several extra curricular activities were planned and conducted throughout the year.

NSS Activities

The NSS programs within the Institute are tailored in such a way that the activities are in accordance with the objectives of the Institute with out modifying the originality of the NSS motto. Even though, activities are few, the quality and the impact of the



programs to the society is highly satisfactory. They are as follows:

- Educational programs: A Special coaching program to the needy students on core subjects of speech and hearing and Kannada teaching classes for the non-Kannada students of the Institute was initiated. Our student volunteers carried out this program during every weekend for duration of one hour. This is an ongoing program. More than 60 volunteers have been benefited with this program in the report year.
- Shramadhan activities: Around 75 & 55 NSS volunteers respectively participated in the tree planting and watering teak plants program in AIISH campus, Mysore on 30.08.08 and 27.09.08. The watering and of teakwood maintenance plants planted at AIISH, at the newly



constructed park opposite to Library and Information centre in the main campus were carried out in five weekends by the NSS volunteers.

• Health programs: Blood Donation Camp was conducted on 31.03.09 in AIISH Campus in collaboration with Blood Bank Unit, K.R.Hospital, Mysore. In this noble activity, 52 volunteers and staff participated and donated the blood. Along with this the identification of blood group was also carried out.

AIISH GYMKHANA

Under the banner of AIISH Gymkhana, talent's day for the children of gymkhana members was conducted. Under Vidya Vikas program, the children of staff members studying upto SSLC were given educational material such as bags, books etc. Apart from

this, the AIISH Gymkhana was involved in planning and conducting the 43rd Anniversary celebrations.

AIISH observed the **Open day** of the institute on 20th November 2008. On this day, the public were allowed to walk into the institute, go through the facilities and



see for themselves the work being done here. They were educated on speech production, hearing mechanism, speech and hearing disorders, prevention of speech and hearing disorders and vocal hygiene. They got themselves tested on certain aspects of speech, language, hearing, reading and writing. This year our focus was on spreading awareness among students from rural areas. In addition, special competitive events were organised for regular school going children and children with different kinds of special needs.

Kannada Rajyostava Day was observed on 20th November 2008. Noted film actor Dr. K.S. Ashwath was the chief guest while Yogashri Dr. A.R Seetharam was the guest of honour. It was presided over by the Director. After inauguration of the program by the chief guest, prizes were distributed to the winners of the cultural and



sports competitions held on behalf of Kannada Rajyothstva celebrations. Cultural events like group dance and singing Kannada songs were held.





In her presidential address, she emphasized on the responsibility and importance of being women. Senior women employee of AIISH Smt. J. Raguna and Smt.

Nagaveni, caregiver of a student at AIISH who is physically challenged were felicitated on

the day. Competitions for women were also conducted.

AIISH Awaaz 2009, an inter collegiate cultural festival and a platform for college students to show case their cultural talents was conducted at AIISH Gymkhana from 13th to 15th March 2009. This was a unique program for the students, by the





students and organized by the students themselves with minimum support from the staff. Noted theatre artist, singer and Director Smt. B. Jayashree was the chief guest. Different cultural competitions such as singing, portrait painting, general quiz, skit, antakshari, group dance and fashion show were conducted for the different college students.

ADMINISTRATIVE ISSUES

Fiscal matters

During the reporting year, a grant-in-aid of Rs. 1152.99 lakhs and Rs. 600 lakhs have been received under Plan and Non-Plan, respectively from the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India. Internal revenue of Rs. 230.40 lakhs was generated during the year. Rs. 20 lakhs were allocated for AIISH Research Fund. Fifteen posts (on contract) were sanctioned for implementation of Oversight Committee recommendation of 27% OBC reservation.

Employee recruitments/deaths

Seven recruitments for permanent and forty nine recruitments for contract basis posts were made in the duration between April 2008 and March 2009. There were two deaths of the permanent employees, viz Sri.Cheluvaraju, Mali on 10/02/09 and Smt. Savithramma, Sweeper on 02/03/09.

Observance of Vigilance Awareness Week

The employees took the pledge on 3.11.2008 which was read out by Central Vigilance Officer Dr S. R. Savithri, in English, and Dr. H. P. Uma Saraswathi,



Hindi Translator in Hindi. Dr. Vijayalakshmi Basavaraj, Director addressed the employees on vigilance and value-based services. Posters related to vigilance were displayed on the notice boards of the institute. A debate competition was also held on 6.11.2008, in which 23 staff and students participated. The topic of the debate was corruption / honesty and there were 3 winners of the competition.

Right to Information Act

Prof. R. Manjula, Prof. of Speech Pathology & Head, POCD Department, AIISH was nominated as Central Public Information Officer of the institute. During the year 2008-09, 18 cases and 13 first appeals were received. Registration amount of Rs. 170/- and an additional amount of Rs. 100/- were collected.

Construction

• Renovation of speech block:

The Speech Language Sciences and Speech Language Pathology block building has been renovated at an estimated cost of Rs. 54.00 lakhs through the Central Public Works Department.

The civil works portion included reconstruction of in-filled walls, strengthening of existing walls by metal mesh plastering, weather proofing the RCC roof, casting the extended RCC columns above roof, polishing the existing mosaic floor and painting inside & outside the building.

The electrical works such as re-conducting, rewiring and fixing electrical light fittings, fixtures including computer & telephone networking have been carried out.

• Construction of Men's Hostel & Guest faculty suites:

The Construction of Men's Hostel & Guest faculty suites is under construction & has a plinth area of 3,720 Sq m for an estimated cost of Rs 495 lakhs. The Construction of Men's Hostel & Guest faculty suites is being made in the panchavati campus. The 94 bedded Men's Hostel consists of 40 single rooms, 18 triple rooms, a dining hall to cater 74 persons at a time & a lift. There are 15 rooms in the guest faculty suites.

Horticulture Section

Some of the developmental work such as planning of ornamental shrubs, hedge plants, development of Mexican lawn and shaded grass lawn were carried out.

Official Language Implementation (OLI)

More number of activities on Implementation of Official language Hindi was taken up in the year 2008-09 by way of conducting various programmes and popularizing the official language in all possible ways.

OLI Meetings: The meetings of OLIC were held regularly and proceedings were sent to the concerned.

Hindi Training: Trials for imparting obligatory training in Hindi to staff were continued. Some of the staff members were deputed for attending Hindi examinations.

OLI Correspondence: A good number of materials for correspondence were rendered in to official language making a remarkable progress during the year under question. Following is the list of such works undertaken:

Video Conferencing facility has been extended to the clients far and wide in Hindi language having eleven centers at different places in the country. Also, some of the answer scripts written in Hindi by the Diploma students of DHLS programme in Jan 2009, were evaluated in Hindi only.

FROM DIRECTOR'S DESK



Communication is the essence of life. Speech, Language and Hearing are involved rigorously in any communication around us. Those deprived of these abilities in whatever form are at a loss affecting their life both quantitatively and qualitatively. The All India Institute of Speech and Hearing (AIISH) has been striving to promote effective communication by one and all. The multidisciplinary and well coordinated team at AIISH has been providing services, training man power, conducting research besides implementing strategies for public education on communication disorders focusing on their prevention, identification, assessment and management.

The All India Institute of Speech and Hearing that was established on the 9th of August 1965 is a premier institution in the country focused on communication and its disorders. In the last 44 years, the institute has grown from its infancy to adulthood in form as well as function. The vision of the institute is met with some of the major objectives of AIISH which include:

- Manpower generation in the field of speech, language and hearing.
- Conducting research both in the areas of basic sciences of speech, language and hearing as well as in the areas of its application for effective communication.

- Providing clinical services to persons with communication disorders along with developing modules for providing services at different levels in the society.
- Striving towards implementing strategies for prevention (be it primary, secondary, tertiary) of communication disorders.
- Public education towards identifying communication disorders in the community.
- Development of materials for better public awareness and education on or about communication disorders and their prevention and management.

Highlights of the year 2008-09

• Proposal for upgradation of AIISH as a Super Specialty Center of Excellence

Although the field of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology as a profession has its roots in other medical and non medical fields, it has grown as an independent profession. The professionals qualified as Speech-Language Pathologists and Audiologists are involved in the rehabilitation of individuals with communication disorders (hearing, speech and language disorders). Successful delivery of services to persons with communication disorders is however a multidisciplinary issue. The country needs qualified and trained manpower in this multidisciplinary amalgamation in different tiers to cater to specific needs of persons with communication disorders of all ages.

There are more than 43 institutions in the country which are actively involved in the generation of trained manpower in the field of communication disorders, offering courses varying from certificate level courses to doctoral degrees. Yet, it has remained evidently insufficient when it comes to the issue of addressing the thrust areas and needs of persons with communication disorders. The reasons from amongst the major ones include *brain drain, inadequate number of trained professionals within the country, high concentration in urban areas resulting in very little or poor representation in the rural areas and other factors.*

There is scarcity of master trainers (teachers) to train manpower in India. In the last 44 years, the institute has trained around 2435 manpower in the area of speech, language and hearing. Of these, 753 are post-graduate students and 44 are Ph.Ds.

Hence the institute submitted a proposal for the "Up-gradation of the All India Institute of Speech & Hearing as "*Super Specialty Centre of Excellence*" to create a variety of manpower to cater to the needs of persons with communication disorders, utilizing all possible modes of education and training to the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India. This proposal was developed considering the recommendations of several stakeholders of the institute, namely the multidisciplinary professionals dealing with communications disorders; the NGOs; the beneficiaries of the institute; and the Alumni of AIISH, obtained through a series of brainstorming meetings held for the purpose.

Ministry of Health & Family Welfare constituted a committee to examine the feasibility of upgradation of AIISH. The committee chaired by Dr. R. K. Srivastava, DGHS, Ministry of Health & Family Welfare that met on 27th June 2008 reviewed the activities of AIISH and recommended submission of a detailed proposal approving the background papers prepared by the institute.

Based on the background papers prepared and suggestions of the committees, a proposal for upgradation of the AIISH, Mysore was prepared and submitted. The Ministry is now looking into this proposal.

• Implementation of 'Oversight Committee' recommendations of OBC reservations

Consequent to Supreme Court judgment and as per the directions issued by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India for implementation of 27% reservation to OBC candidates in the admission to professional courses run by the institutions, action has been initiated to provide reservation to the students belonging to OBC category for the academic year 2008-09. The seats for each course conducted at the institute were increased to accommodate this reservation. Accordingly, 9 students in undergraduate (UG) and 18 students in Postgraduate (PG) (9 Audiology & 9 Speech-Language Pathology respectively) were given admission in the reporting academic year.

A proposal to create additional faculty and technical staff along with additional infrastructure was submitted to Ministry of Health and Family Welfare for consideration.

• Proposal for 'Deemed to be university' status to UGC

A detailed proposal for 'Deemed to be university' status to the institute was prepared and submitted to the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare for approval and recommendations. The same was forwarded by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare to the Ministry of Human Resource Development by the Ministry itself, which in turn was forwarded to UGC for the needful.

• The 52nd Executive Council of the institute approved the following:

- a. Thirty six seats each in M.Sc (Audiology) and M.Sc (SLP) with stipulated proportion of reservations.
- b. Enhancement of Junior Research Fellowship to be at par with that of assistantships given to full time Ph.D students at IITs.
- c. The post-doctoral fellowship to be at 25% over and above the Junior Research Fellowship.
- d. The Non-faculty members to register for Ph.D.
- e. Accept the donation amount from the "Friends" United Organization Endowment Scholarship to stipulated category of student every year.

ACADEMIC ACTIVITIES

In line with the objective of the institute to generate manpower, the institute conducted 13 long term training programs. Theoretical, practical and clinical training was imparted to the trainees using state-of-the-art technology by a highly qualified team of staff.

New Academic Programs

• Launch of two PG diploma programs

P.G. Diploma in Forensic Speech Sciences and Technology and P.G. Diploma in Clinical Linguistics for Speech-Language Pathologists were launched with the affiliation to University of Mysore. P.G. Diploma in Forensic Speech Sciences and Technology intends to train professionals in the area of speaker identification which would be applicable in forensic sciences. This credit based self financed trimester program was initiated with two students. The P.G. Diploma in Clinical Linguistics for Speech-Language Pathologists intends to equip the speech-language pathologists to assess, diagnose, plan intervention and conduct research programs for communication disorders in the Indian language context. Though it was launched it could not be initiated because there were no student takers. These are the first courses of their kind in India.

• Diploma in Hearing, Language and Speech: Launch of six additional study centers

To hasten the rate of manpower development in the area of Speech and Hearing and to support the National Program of Prevention and Control of Deafness (NPPCD) of Government of India in the country, **The Diploma in Hearing Language and Speech** (**DHLS**) (through distance mode) was conceived in the year 2007-08 with five study centers at Mysore, Delhi, Puducherry, Mumbai and Imphal. In the year 2008-09 the program was further expanded by starting six additional study centers viz. at Indira Gandhi Medical College, **Shimla**, Chathrapati Sahuji Maharaj Medical University, **Lucknow**, Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College, **Ajmer**, Rajasthan, S.C.B. Medical College, **Cuttack**, Orissa, Rajendra Medical Sciences, **Ranchi**, Jharkhand and N.S.C.B Medical College, **Jabalpur**, Madhya Pradesh, thus totaling it to eleven study centers. The plan to impart the theory part of the program through terrestrial linked videoconferencing facility from AIISH, Mysore and to impart clinical training at the eleven study centers which was approved both by the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare as well as by RCI was implemented smoothly for the second year as well. A total of 211 students enrolled in these centers.

• Launch of a New Department

The new department of *Centre for Rehabilitation Education through Distance Mode (CREDM)* was inaugurated by Dr. Anbumani Ramdoss, Hon'ble Union Minister for Health and Family Welfare on 5th Jan 2009. This department seeks to reach out clinical and supportive services to those who cannot come to Mysore. E-learning packages covering all types of communication disorders and live demonstrations of assessment and intervention techniques for the caregivers / clients with communication disorders is being prepared.

• AIISH- SSA Project

AIISH initiated a collaborative project with Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA) – Karnataka for sensitizing IERTs (Integrated Education Resource Trainers) to deal with academic problems in school going children. This is a two and half year long project under which approx. 1000 nos. of IERTs will be trained in batches of 40 resource teachers with the view to sensitize over 2.5 lakhs of primary school teachers. So far 40 IERTs have been trained in the first batch.

• Diploma in Teaching the Young Hearing Impaired (DTYHI)

This program which was launched in the reporting year is approved by the RCI. This diploma program helps in generation of manpower which will cater to the needs of children with hearing impairment below three years of age and their caregivers. The students will be provided with in-depth theoretical knowledge and hands on skill training for the identification and basic rehabilitation of the communicatively handicapped. The report year had eight admissions for this course.

New admissions

• Graduate and Post graduate program

B.Sc (Speech and Hearing) continued to be the well sought after professional program in the country. Around 418 applications were received from students from various parts of India and abroad. National level entrance examinations were conducted for admission to B.Sc (Speech and Hearing), M.Sc (Speech-Language Pathology) and M.Sc (Audiology) programs. 247 students appeared for the B.Sc (Speech and Hearing) entrance examination conducted at Delhi, Kolkata, Guwahati, Mumbai, Chennai and Mysore. The entrance examinations for M.Sc were conducted at Mysore and 155 & 147 students appeared for M.Sc Speech-Language Pathology & Audiology entrance examinations, respectively. The institute received 349 applications and succeeded in filling up 100% seats in M.Sc (Speech-Language Pathology) and M.Sc (Audiology). However, the enrollment in M.S.Ed (HI) and Diploma in Hearing Aid and Ear mould Technology was rather poor, with 5 and 4 of the 20 seats respectively. 27% OBC

reservation was implemented in the current year filling up a total of an additional 27 seats in UG and PG courses.

Doctoral program

Seven doctoral students were awarded the doctoral degree. Two students submitted their thesis for award of degree. Two new students were awarded Junior Research Fellowship to pursue Ph.D. In total, there were 13 full time junior research fellows (JRFs) and four part time doctoral candidates, who were pursuing their Ph.D at the institute in the report year.

• Post Doctoral Program

To meet the demands for research in the field of speech, language and hearing, the institute introduced two Post-Doctoral Fellowships in the area of speech, language and hearing from the year 2007-08. Though it did not have any takers last year, this fellowship is open to all those who have required qualification and flair for research in the area of speech, language and hearing.

Other Programs

- Certificate Course for Caregivers of Children with Developmental Communication Disabilities (C4D2) was launched in the year 2007–08 and 5 batches of caregivers (95 students) completed the C4D2 course for which the study material was developed. During the year, two contact programs were conducted for parent participants.
- Prof. Asha Yathiraj, Head, Department of Audiology, AIISH conducted a part of the Continuing Education Program (CEP) on 'Central Auditory Processing Disorders' at the 41st ISHACON 2009 at Pune (Indian Speech and Hearing Association conference).
- Prof. R. Manjula, Head, Department of Prevention of Communication Disorders and Dr. P. Manjula, Reader-Audiology visited Disabilities Studies Department, Faculty of Medicine, University of Kelaniya, Colombo, Sri Lanka as examiners and to develop curriculum for the speech and hearing course there.

Prof. Shyamala, K.C., Head, Department of Material Development conducted a course on 'Bilingual Aphasia' for European Masters program in Clinical Linguistics (EMCL) program from May to July 2008 at Potsdam, Germany.

Short Term Training Programs

The institute continued to offer short term training programs for speech, language and hearing as well as allied professionals and target groups. **Forty one** such programs were organized in the reporting year targeting speech, language and hearing professionals, clinical psychologists, ENT specialists, and special educators. Some of the areas covered were diagnostic and therapeutic procedures, acoustic measurement, instrumentation in speech-language sciences, clinical counseling and cognitive behavior therapy.

Staff enrichment and sensitization programs were conducted on 10 topics through 25 sessions by the Department of special education throughout May 2008. A 3 day short term training program was held for enrichment of knowledge and skills among 13 diploma students in special education and 10 special educators in special schools at Mysore.

In addition to this, several national and international guest faculties, representing institutes and universities far and wide delivered guest lectures on upcoming topics and topics of current interest. The below mentioned are a few of them:

Seminars / Conferences / Workshops

Apart from conducting several in-house training programs to train diploma, undergraduate and postgraduate students, around 25 workshops and 2 seminars were conducted by different departments of the institute.

The institute continued to encourage its faculty and staff to update their knowledge by deputing them to attend workshops/seminars. The faculty and staff of the institute attended 34 workshops conducted by other organizations and 26 workshops/ seminars/ conferences conducted by AIISH. To mention a few:

- Department of CREDM conducted a workshop on "Feasible Models of early intervention in children with Hearing Impairment (Brainstorming Session)" on 25th April 2008.
- Department of Special Education conducted a workshop on "Facilitating Inclusive Education for Children with Hearing Impairment" from 30th June to 4th July 2008.
- Department of ENT conducted a workshop on "Reversible Hearing Impairment in children" on 23rd July 2008.
- Department of Speech-Language Pathology conducted a Seminar on "Perspectives in children with Down's syndrome" on 10th November 2008.
- Department of Speech-Language Sciences and Clinical Services conducted a workshop on "Speech Intelligibility" from 15th to 19th December 2008.
- Department of Speech-Language Pathology conducted a workshop on "Child Language Disorders" on 17th December 2008.
- Department of Speech-Language Sciences conducted a National Workshop on "Phonetic Perception" on 19th and 20th February 2009.

In addition, the modifications to be made in the syllabus were recommended. Prof. Asha Yathiraj was the coordinator for the program.

PARTICIPATION IN NATIONAL PROGRAM FOR PREVENTION AND CONTROL OF DEAFNESS (NPPCD)

AIISH being the Nodal Center for manpower development for implementation of National Program for Prevention and Control of Deafness (NPPCD), participated in all activities of NPPCD.

- B.Sc. (Speech and Hearing) interns of AIISH were placed in the districts all over India where NPPCD is implemented. This included Mandya, Hassan, Hubli, Lucknow, Haridwar, Vellore, Puducherry, Cuttack, Guwahati, Mumbai and Jabalpur.
- AIISH provided technical specifications for Audiological equipment and hearing aids.
- AIISH tendered for Behind the Ear (BTE) Hearing aids to be distributed under NPPCD and completed the process of rate contract finalization. It also developed the guidelines for the selection and distribution of BTE Hearing aids which is now used all over the country by individuals with hearing impairment.

LIBRARY AND INFORMATION CENTRE

The AIISH library and information centre is an outstanding learning resource centre and is the best specialized libraries in the country in the field of speech, language and hearing. It provides appropriate knowledge resources to meet the information needs of the academic community of the institute by providing the most modern resources and value added information services in the area of speech, language and hearing. It caters to the students, faculty, researchers of the institute, elite professionals, educational institutions and other authorized users in the related discipline of speech, language and hearing from different parts of the country.

The collection of the library which includes books, journals, theses, dissertations, departmental projects, independent projects and other non-book material is regarded one of the richest collections in the country, in the field of Audiology, Speech-Language Pathology, Speech-Language Sciences, Special Education and allied fields.

529 books were added during the year bringing the collection up to 16,275 volumes in the reporting year. 68 journals and 40 e-journals were subscribed. All together, a sum of Rs. 27,65,586/- was spent to procure these books and journals.

The digitalization process of the library which commenced in the beginning of the reporting year is nearing completion. In-house publication like Masters dissertations, Doctoral theses and independent projects are converted from print format to digital format. Through Electronic Resources in Medicine (ERMED) consortium, AIISH is getting online access to journals in the National Medical Library. More computers were added with the increase in broadband. Library portal is under development in the reporting year.

RESEARCH ACTIVITIES

The institute has been a forerunner in conducting innovative research in the domains of speech, language, hearing and their disorders. The research projects are undertaken by the institute with extra mural fund as well as AIISH Research Fund. In the reporting year, 5 Extramural funding research projects, 10 AIISH Research Fund projects and 6 departmental research projects were underway while eight research projects as well as 2 in-house programs were completed.

As an outcome of the research undertaken, there were several research publications which saw the light of the day. In the reporting year, the faculty had to their credit, 142 publications. These included 4 international publications, 18 national publications, 68 internal publications and 9 books/chapters in books. CLINICAL SERVICES

The institute offers a wide range of clinical services to persons with communication disorders, their family and professionals. The Department of Clinical Services is one of its kind in the country. A team of speech, language, hearing and allied medical and non-medical professionals cater to the clients under one roof. Apart from the core services in the area of speech-language pathology and audiology, services of allied professionals such as otolaryngologists, pediatrician, neurologist, plastic surgeon, prosthodontist, phonosurgeon, clinical psychologist, physiotherapist and occupational therapists etc., are also available in the department. In the reporting year, a total of 40,709 clients were attended to, in the clinic. 17276 new clients were registered, 23443 follow up clients were evaluated and 21205 individual therapy sessions were conducted.

The institute runs Specialty Clinics to attend to the needs of clients with special disorders. This includes the Listening Training Unit under the Department of Audiology; Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) Unit, Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) Unit and Craniofacial Unit under the Department of Speech-Language Pathology; Professional Voice Care Center and Forensic Voice Unit dealing with the analysis related to speaker identification under the Department of Speech-Language Sciences.

A high-tech CCTV which was installed in the year 2007-08, covering 96 rooms with eight monitor stations was used for active monitoring of therapy sessions of clients. Each room is fitted with a CCTV camera and microphone to facilitate live two way audio interaction and one way video interaction between both the student supervisor and the student clinician. This enables the supervisors to modify the activities and techniques adopted by the student therapist whenever indicated. This enhanced the quantum of supervision provided. Individual as well as group therapy were provided depending upon the needs of the clients.

The institute started dispensing hearing aids of all styles and makes at subsidized rates since December 2006. This scheme has been ensuring the quality of the hearing aid dispensed and has also made the process of procurement of hearing aids hassle free to the clients. In the reporting year, 1059 hearing aids of over twelve makes and models including Behind The Ear (BTE) type, In The Ear (ITE) type, Completely-In-the Canal (CIC) types were dispensed under this scheme.

The following programs in addition to the diagnostic and therapeutic services were rendered:

- International Stuttering Awareness Day was celebrated on 14th November 2008. The program included orientation lectures on stuttering, its signs and symptoms, psychological and fluency management of stuttering. An exhibition and various competitions were held for the participants following by group discussion.
- Commemoration of the 22nd World Disabled Day on 3rd December 2008 was coordinated by the Department of Special Education. Around 550 spectators including clients, caregivers and staff attended the programme. Cultural programmes were presented by AIISH clients and caregivers.

CLINICAL STATISTICS OF VARIOUS DEPARTMENTS

Department of Audiology

A total of 21,940 clients were evaluated in the department. Among them, hearing evaluation for 11,656, hearing aid trial (HAT) for 7386, HAT counseling for 1189 were carried out and 1709 ear mold impressions were taken.

A total of 10442 and 1214 clients were evaluated/screened at AIISH and at Outreach centers respectively. The following is the statistics of clients evaluated using the special tests at the institute.

Preschool Activities

Department of Special Education

The Department of Special Education provides clinical and educational services to children with different kinds of communication disorders under preschool training program. This program aims at promoting all round development in these children and preparing them with skills necessary for later schooling and integration. The training programmes comprise of essential skills like language, listening, cognitive, self-help, and pre-academics among others. It includes the group comprising of children with hearing impairment, mental retardation and autism in four different language groups i.e., Kannada, Hindi, Malayalam and English. In the report year, 165 children were enrolled in 21 groups of preschool catering to children with hearing impairment, mental retardation, autism and other multiple disabilities. These children attended the preschool every day for four hours. The month wise statistics is given below:

In addition to the regular activities, the preschool was active in conducting the following programs:

Organisation of Camps formed an integral part of the co-curricular activities of the preschool. These camps endeavour to add to holistic development in children with special needs as well as enrich the latent talents of caregivers. The following camps were held during the year April 2008 and March 2009:

Summer Camp was held during the summer vacation from 1st to 31st May 2008, which involved activities such as Yoga & Physical Exercise, Arts and Crafts, Dance & Music and Games for the children. As part of Summer Camp, a field visit was organised for the children to Mysore Milk Diary and Natural Science Museum. Activities like making nutritious snacks and talent show were organised for parents. Reverse integration including typically developing children along with the children with special needs was the highlight of this programme.

Dasara Camp was held during the Dasara vacation from 29th September to 12th October 2008 which included activities such as Yoga & Physical Exercise, Arts and Crafts, Dance & Music. A visit to the Mysore zoo and *Gombe Mane* (doll house) *was* also organised as part of the camp activities.

Best Caregiver Award is given away periodically to encourage caregivers participation and involvement in the children's education as well as preschool activities. The following awards were given away in the current year:

- Caregivers Ms. Leelavathy Chennakeshava & Mr. Chennakeshava, parents of baby Manasa among parents of 'fruit' group, and Ms. Indu, mother of Master Nishanth of flower group were felicitated on 11.04.2008.
- Caregivers Ms. Nischal, M/o Baby Sinchana and Ms. Joby M/o Master Jabin from 'Fruit' Groups; and Ms. Nandini, M/o Master Dhyan from 'Colour' Groups were felicitated on 10.11.2008.

EXTENSION SERVICES

The Department of Prevention of Communication Disorders (POCD) was initiated as a part of plan activity of the institute in January 2008. The institute continued with its activities of prevention of deafness and hearing impairment and prevention of communication disorders. Under the infant screening program infants were screened for hearing loss, in 11 hospitals in Mysore. On an average 13570 children were screened at extension services, 236 children in schools and 21 were referred to AIISH for the assessment of hearing loss. Those who failed the screening test were referred for detailed evaluation at the institute to ascertain hearing loss and to provide the required intervention.

Camps: Periodically AIISH conducts outstation camps on requests by NGO's usually to rural and remote areas where professional help is not easily available. Multidisciplinary team visits the place, conducts the screening for speech and hearing disorders and also provides rehabilitation services such as dispensing of hearing aid, counseling on listening training, home training etc. 25 camps were held in the reporting year in different districts of Karnataka, Kerala and Tamil Nadu. The details of the camps are given in the table below:

PUBLIC LECTURE SERIES

AIISH continued "Monthly Public Lecture Series" program with the objective of reaching the unreached. The main purpose of this program is to create awareness in the public on various communication disorders. In this program, experts in the field of communication disorders deliver one-hour lecture (on topics such as stuttering, articulation disorders, autism, aphasia, mental retardation, hearing problems, ENT problems, voice problems, etc.) followed by question and answer sessions with the public on the last Saturday of every month. Twelve lectures covering the topics of hearing problems in children, management of behaviour problems, aphasia- identification and management, cochlear implant - a promising surgical procedure for the hearing impaired, hearing problems in senior citizens, cleft lip and palate: cause & management, benefits & concessions for persons with

disability, importance of listening in the development of speech and language, autism: causes, characteristics, diagnosis and intervention, learning disability-identification and management and misarticulation: causes and remediation have been delivered so far as part of the program in the report year.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The students enrolled in various programs of AIISH and got an excellent opportunity for their overall development during their tenure at the institute. Several extra curricular activities were planned and conducted throughout the year.

NSS Activities

The NSS programs within the Institute are tailored in such a way that the activities are in accordance with the objectives of the Institute with out modifying the originality of the NSS motto. Even though, activities are few, the quality and the impact of the programs to the society is highly satisfactory. They are as follows:

- Educational programs: A Special coaching program to the needy students on core subjects of speech and hearing and Kannada teaching classes for the non-Kannada students of the Institute was initiated. Our student volunteers carried out this program during every weekend for duration of one hour. This is an ongoing program. More than 60 volunteers have been benefited with this program in the report year.
- Shramadhan activities: Around 75 & 55 NSS volunteers respectively participated in the tree planting and watering teak plants program in AIISH campus, Mysore on 30.08.08 and 27.09.08. The watering and maintenance of teakwood plants planted at AIISH, at the newly constructed park opposite to Library and Information centre in the main campus were carried out in five weekends by the NSS volunteers.
- Health programs: Blood Donation Camp was conducted on 31.03.09 in AIISH Campus in collaboration with Blood Bank Unit, K.R.Hospital, Mysore. In this noble activity, 52 volunteers and staff participated and donated the blood. Along with this the identification of blood group was also carried out.

AIISH GYMKHANA

Under the banner of AIISH Gymkhana, talent's day for the children of gymkhana members was conducted. Under Vidya Vikas program, the children of staff members studying upto SSLC were given educational material such as bags, books etc. Apart from this, the AIISH Gymkhana was involved in planning and conducting the 43rd Anniversary celebrations.

AIISH observed the **Open day** of the institute on 20th November 2008. On this day, the public were allowed to walk into the institute, go through the facilities and see for themselves the work being done here. They were educated on speech production, hearing mechanism, speech and hearing disorders, prevention of speech and hearing disorders and vocal hygiene. They got themselves tested on certain aspects of speech, language, hearing, reading and writing. This year our focus was on spreading awareness among students from rural areas. In addition, special competitive events were organised for regular school going children and children with different kinds of special needs.

Kannada Rajyothtsava Day was observed on 20th November 2008. Noted film actor Dr. K.S. Ashwath was the chief guest while Yogashri Dr. A.R Seetharam was the guest of honour. It was presided over by the Director. After inauguration of the program by the chief guest, prizes were distributed to the winners of the cultural and sports competitions held on behalf of Kannada Rajyothtsava celebrations. Cultural events like group dance and singing Kannada songs were held.

Celebration of the **International Woman's day** was held on 11.3.2009. Dr. Vijayalaksmi Basavaraj, President of Gymkhana and Director, AIISH presided over the function. In her presidential address, she emphasized on the responsibility and importance of being women. Senior women employee of AIISH Smt. J. Raguna and Smt. Nagaveni, caregiver of a student at AIISH who is physically challenged were felicitated on the day. Competitions for women were also conducted.

AIISH Awaaz 2009, an inter collegiate cultural festival and a platform for college students to show case their cultural talents was conducted at AIISH Gymkhana from 13th to 15th March 2009. This was a unique program for the students, by the students and organized by the students themselves with minimum support from the staff. Noted theatre artist, singer and Director Smt. B. Jayashree was the chief guest. Different cultural competitions such as singing, portrait painting, general quiz, skit, antakshari, group dance and fashion show were conducted for the different college students.

ADMINISTRATIVE ISSUES

Fiscal matters

During the reporting year, a grant-in-aid of Rs. 1152.99 lakhs and Rs. 600 lakhs have been received under Plan and Non-Plan, respectively from the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Govt. of India. Internal revenue of Rs. 230.40 lakhs was generated during the year. Rs. 20 lakhs were allocated for AIISH Research Fund. Fifteen posts (on contract) were sanctioned for implementation of Oversight Committee recommendation of 27% OBC reservation.

Employee recruitments/deaths

Seven recruitments for permanent and forty nine recruitments for contract basis posts were made in the duration between April 2008 and March 2009. There were two deaths of the permanent employees, viz Sri.Cheluvaraju, Mali on 10/02/09 and Smt. Savithramma, Sweeper on 02/03/2009.

Observance of Vigilance Awareness Week

The employees took the pledge on 3.11.2008 which was read out by Central Vigilance Officer Dr S. R. Savithri, in English, and Dr. H. P. Uma Saraswathi, Hindi Translator in Hindi. Dr. Vijayalakshmi Basavaraj, Director addressed the employees on vigilance and value-based services. Posters related to vigilance were displayed on the notice boards of the institute. A debate competition was also held on 6.11.2008, in which 23 staff and students participated. The topic of the debate was corruption / honesty and there were 3 winners of the competition.

Right to Information Act

Prof. R. Manjula, Prof. of Speech Pathology & Head, POCD Department, AIISH was nominated as Central Public Information Officer of the institute. During the year 2008-09, 18 clients and 13 first appeals were received. Registration amount of Rs. 170/- and an additional amount of Rs. 100/- were collected.

Construction

Renovation of speech block:

The Speech-Language Sciences and Speech-Language Pathology block building has been renovated at an estimated cost of Rs. 54.00 lakhs through the Central Public Works Department.

The civil works portion included reconstruction of in-filled walls, strengthening of existing walls by metal mesh plastering, weather proofing the RCC roof, casting the extended RCC columns above roof, polishing the existing mosaic floor and painting inside & outside the building.

The electrical works such as re-conducting, rewiring and fixing electrical light fittings, fixtures including computer & telephone networking have been carried out.

• Construction of Men's Hostel & Guest faculty suites:

The Men's Hostel & Guest faculty suites are under construction and have a plinth area of 3,720 Sq m for an estimated cost of Rs 495 lakhs. These are being made in the Panchavati campus. The 94 bedded Men's Hostel consists of 40 single rooms, 18 triple rooms, a dining hall to cater 74 persons at a time & a lift. There are 15 rooms in the guest faculty suites.

Horticulture Section

Some of the developmental work such as planning of ornamental shrubs, hedge plants, development of Mexican lawn and shaded grass lawn were carried out.

Official Language Implementation (OLI)

More number of activities on Implementation of Official language Hindi was taken up in the year 2008-09 by way of conducting various programmes and popularizing the official language in all possible ways.

OLI Meetings: The meetings of OLIC were held regularly and proceedings were sent to the concerned.

Hindi Training: Trials for imparting obligatory training in Hindi to staff were continued. Some of the staff members were deputed for attending Hindi examinations.

OLI Correspondence: A good number of materials for correspondence were rendered in to official language making a remarkable progress during the year under question. Following is the list of such works undertaken:

Hindi speaking clients visiting the institute for their problems were counseled in Hindi.

Word a day in Hindi with English equivalents were displayed at five different prominent places having access for staff, students as well as general public i.e., in Administrative Block, Academic Block, Library, Department of Clinical Services and Preschool Training Centre. These words from English to Hindi included Technical and Scientific words for the benefit of student folk in particular.

Reports: Monthly, quarterly, half yearly and yearly reports in official language were furnished to the concerned.

Many letters to outside organizations, Office Notes etc., were **signed in Hindi** in addition to sending replies in Hindi to the letters received in Hindi.

Speech & Hearing Glossary 2008 (English-Hindi). This was a maiden attempt for the benefit of the staff and students engaged in this field. This was released on the occasion of Annual day celebrations on 9th August 2008.

Distance Education through Video Conferencing facility has been extended to the clients far and wide in Hindi language having eleven centers at different places in the country. Also, some of the answer scripts written in Hindi by the Diploma students of DHLS programme in Jan 2009, were evaluated in Hindi only.

Hindi Workshop: External

- Dr. H P Uma Saraswathi, Hindi Translator was deputed to deliver guest lecture at the Hindi Workshop arranged by BSNL, Mysore on 28.07.2008.
- (ii) Dr. H P Uma Saraswathi, Hindi Translator was deputed to attend a National Functional Workshop at the Institute of Public Administration, Bangalore from 22.08.2008 to 23.08.2008.

Workshop: Internal

One day Workshop on translation of Public education materials (focused on ASD) in three Indian languages including Hindi was organized by the Dept. of Material Development at AIISH on 23.03.2009.

Hindi MILAP daily news bulletin was subscribed.

The Library of Hindi books was kept open for general reading for the staff & students.

Leap Office Software is being extensively used at the institute. Also, use of Microsoft Office software (multiple language editions) is on anvil.

Purchase of Technical/ other equipment

The institute procured 89 technical equipments to further enhance the infrastructure capabilities to serve the persons with communication disorders. The Institute has procured equipments for a total worth of Rs.4,35,50,000.00.

Thus, the overall progress of the institute was excellent. The preparations made to reach out the services of the institute to the nation were very challenging and satisfying. The involvement of the team of faculty & staff at the institute enabled the institute to face these challenges effectively.

Functioning under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India, this premier institute is responsible for generation of quality manpower. It also includes the able faculty from the departments of allied Clinical areas such Departments of Psychology, as Electronics, Otorhinolaryngology, Material Development, and Special Education. The Academic Section coordinates the various academic activities related to students and faculty.

02. New Admissions

B.Sc (Speech and Hearing) continued to be the well sought after professional program in the country. Around 418 applications were received from students from various parts of India and abroad. National level entrance examinations were conducted for admission to B.Sc (Speech and Hearing), M.Sc (Speech-Language Pathology) and M.Sc (Audiology) programs. 247 students appeared for the B.Sc (Speech and Hearing) entrance examination conducted at Delhi, Kolkata, Guwahati, Mumbai, Chennai and Mysore filling up 44 seats in B.S (Speech and Hearing). The entrance examinations for M.Sc were conducted at Mysore and received 349 applications and 155 & 147 students appeared for M.Sc (Speech-Language Pathology) & M.Sc (Audiology) entrance examination, respectively. The institute succeeded in filling up 35 seats in M.Sc (Speech-Language Pathology), 32 seats in M.Sc (Audiology). However, the enrollment in M.S.Ed (HI) and Diploma in Hearing Aid and Ear mould Technology was rather poor, filling up 5

and 4 of the 20 seats respectively. 27% OBC reservation was implemented in the current year filling up a total of an additional 27 seats in UG and PG courses.

03. New Academic programs

a) PG Diploma in Forensic Speech Science and Technology: The credit based self financed trimester program trains personnel in the area of speaker identification and it is affiliated to the University of Mysore. This program commenced from the

academic year 2008-09 with 2 students. This is the first credit based program at the Institute and is also the first course of its kind in India.

- b) PG Diploma in Clinical Linguistics for Speech-Language Pathology: The University of Mysore approved the affiliation of PG Diploma in Clinical Linguistics for Speech-Language Pathology, which was initiated in the academic year 2008-09. This course is also the first course of its kind in India. This course intends to equip the speech-language pathologists to assess, diagnose, plan intervention and conduct research programs for communication disorders in the Indian language context. Though it was launched it could not be initiated because there were no student takers.
- c) M.Ed (Hearing Impairment) AIISH Scheme, an integrated two year program with provision for lateral entry for B.S.Ed (HI) students is awaiting approval from the competent authority.
- d) Diploma in Teaching Young Hearing Impaired (DTYHI): This diploma program launched in the reporting year is approved by the RCI and helps in generation of manpower which will cater to the needs of children with hearing impairment below 3 years of age and their caregivers. Eight candidates were enrolled for DTYHI program during the current academic year.

Diploma in Hearing Language and Speech (DHLS)

• The Diploma in Hearing Language and Speech Program through Distance Mode conceived in the year 2007-08 with five study centers including Mysore to generate manpower in the area of Speech and Hearing was continued successfully in the reporting year also. In the year 2008-09 the program was further expanded by starting 6 additional study centers which makes it a total of 11 study centers. This program through video conferencing is approved both by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare as well as by the Rehabilitation Council of India. The Memorandum of Understanding between AIISH and the 6 new study centers were signed in the presence of Dr. R. K. Srivastava, Director General of Health Services, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare, Government of India who also launched the study centers. The Directors of the study centers were present in their respective study centers viz., Dr. N. C. Sharma, Principal, Jawaharlal Nehru Medical College and Associated Group of Hospitals, Ajmer; Dr. P. K. Chinara,

Principal and Dr. Sachidananda Panda, Prof. ENT, S. C. B Medical College, Cuttack; Dr. R. K. Shukla, Prof. ENT & Mr. Ramesh, Audiologist of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Medical College, Jalabalpur; Prof. Saroj Chooramani Gopal, Vice Chancellor and Dr. S. P. Agarwal, Prof. ENT of Chhatrapati Shahuji Maharaj Medical University, Lucknow University, Lucknow; Dr. N. N. Agarwal, Director, Rajendra Institute of Medical Sciences Ranchi, Jharkhand and Dr. N. K. Mohindroo, Professor & HOD – ENT, Indira Gandhi Medical College, Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla.

This will support the National Program of Prevention and Control of Deafness of Government of India which was also the approved by the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare and Rehabilitation Council of India. The admission to the six new DHLS centers was 100%. A total of 211 students enrolled in all these centers.

- Self learning materials for the six courses offered under the program prepared by faculty of AIISH were reviewed and modifications were made taking the feed back from the course teachers, students and supervisors.
- The classes through videoconferencing commenced on 18th Aug. 2008. The classes are going on regularly for 4 hours per day for 5 days in a week and the clinical training is underway at the respective study centers.
- The coordinators' meeting is being organized from time to time through videoconferencing.
- Midterm and monthly tests for internal assessment were conducted from time to time.
- An AIISH Research Fund Project initiated for the process evaluation of the program last year, is ongoing.

04. Results

A total of 6 Diploma (Hearing Aid and Ear mould Technology), 37 B.Sc (Sp. & Hg.), 19 M.Sc (Audiology), 19 M.Sc (Speech-Language Pathology), and 06 M.S.Ed (HI) students successfully completed the training program. A brief summary of the results is given below:

LIBRARY AND INFORMATION CENTRE

1. Activities

The AIISH library and information centre is the main outstanding learning resource centre and is the best specialized libraries in the country in the field of speech, language and hearing. It provides appropriate knowledge resources to meet the information needs of the academic community of the institute by providing the most modern resources and value added information services in the area of speech, language and hearing. It caters to the students, faculty, researchers of the institute, elite professionals, educational institutions and other authorized users in the related discipline of speech, language and hearing from different parts of the country.

The Library is open from 8.30 am to 8.00 pm from Monday to Friday and from 9.00 am to 5.00 pm on Saturdays.

Collection & Development

The collection of the library which includes books, journals, theses, dissertations, departmental projects, independent projects and other non-book material is regarded one of the richest collections in the country, in the field of Audiology, Speech-Language Pathology, Speech-language sciences, Special education and their allied fields.

Newly acquired books have been classified, catalogued using Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC) scheme and AACR II. The entire collection is organized in a systematic order and kept ready for use. Care is taken to ensure that the users can locate the desired document quickly. The details of the number of books and journals acquired during the reporting year have been provided in the table.

The OPAC is one of the most heavily used databases of the library and is accessible all the time via LAN. The users found it more comfortable and retrieval is expeditious. Besides listing all the documents available in the library, it indicates status of documents. OPAC is searchable by author, title, accession number, subject and other several fields.

E-Journals:

The AIISH Library currently provides access to over 35 electronic journals via LAN to encourage the spirit of research among faculties, students and researchers of the institute. Access to these journals is usually authenticated by IP address.

Digital Library:

At the third floor of the library an internet browsing centre has been setup to provide IT based information service to users of the library. Library has taken an initiative to provide Digital Library services to the users. Under the Digital library project the conversion of print documents of in-house publication to digital/electronic form is under process. In due course the same will be hosted at the web portal of the library.

The digitalization process of the library which commenced in the beginning of the reporting year is nearing completion. In-house publication like Masters dissertations, Doctoral theses and independent projects are converted from print format to digital format. Through Electronic Resources in Medicine (ERMED) consortium, AIISH is getting online access to journals in the National Medical Library. More computers were added with the increase in broadband. Library portal is under development in the reporting year.

III. CLINICAL AND OTHER SERVICES

The institute has been providing services to individuals with communication disorders following a multidisciplinary approach with consultancy services for identification, assessment and management of communication disorders. The services include:

- A. Clinical Services
- **B.** Specialized Clinical Services
- C. Technological Services

A. CLINICAL SERVICES

The clinical services are provided for diagnosis and rehabilitation of communication disorders with a team of professionals under various specialized units. Various departments housed at the institute have specific roles in these services. These include a whole range of activities towards prevention, identification, evaluation and assessment, management, counseling and guidance, extension services, follow up services and community based services for individuals with speech, language and hearing disorders. Table III.1 provides an overview of major clinical services offered by various departments of the institute.

1. DEPARTMENT OF AUDIOLOGY

A major objective of the Department of Audiology is to render qualitative diagnostic and rehabilitative services to individuals belonging to different walks of life. Individuals with hearing impairment were evaluated using a test battery approach. This was done using state-of-art equipment. It was also involved in hearing aid fitting and prescription. Cochlear implant services such as selecting candidates and mapping have been carried out. Full time rehabilitative services to improve the auditory perceptual abilities of those with peripheral and central auditory problems were provided through the listening training unit. The ear mould lab catered to clients who were prescribed different types of ear moulds. Extending the services of the ear mould lab, the shell making section was inaugurated on the first of January 2009.

a. Hearing Evaluation

As in the past there was a steady rise in the number of clients who came for hearing evaluation. There was a marked increase in individuals seeking disability certificates. Consequently, there was a rise in number of physiological and electrophysiological tests carried out in the department. These tests were of greater use in testing the difficult-to-test population. It also helped in evaluating the patients who could avail the benefits of physically handicapped certificate. Clients with noise induced hearing loss were counseled after evaluation regarding conservation of hearing and management.




Figure III.1: No. of clients screened/evaluated at AIISH/outreach center



b. Hearing Aid Trial

Patients with a complaint of reduced hearing acuity which cannot be treated with medicine / surgery were evaluated for the usefulness of hearing aids / cochlear implants / assistive devices. This was done after a detailed diagnostic evaluation. A total of 7386 individuals were evaluated for their hearing problems. Of them, 6725 clients were evaluated at AIISH and 661 evaluated in outreach programs. The details are provided in the table below:




Figure III.3: Types of hearing aids prescribed

c. Hearing Aid Dispensing Scheme

Through the year three more companies joined the scheme, taking the number of makes of hearing aids dispensed to thirteen. 


Figure III.4: Different types of hearing aids dispensed

d. Counselling and Guidance

Counseling and hearing aid demonstration were carried out for 1189 patients who have been issued or procured hearing aids. Individuals with poor speech identification ability were advised to use communication strategies and speech reading.

e. Ear moulds

Ear moulds play an important role in providing the comfort and best-fit for patients wearing hearing aids. 2708 custom ear moulds were made for 1709 clients. At camps 385 ear moulds were made for 228 clients. Table III.6 and Figure III.5, shows the details of earmolds made at AIISH. In addition, 13 earplugs were made to be used as ear protective devices by swimmers and industrial workers.




Figure III.5: Statistics of ear moulds issued

2. DEPARTMENT OF CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGY

Diagnostic services:

Almost all clients registered at the institute undergo routine psychometric evaluation for differential diagnosis. Pre-vocational assessment is carried out for adolescents/adults with communication disorders. Neuro-psychological evaluations are conducted for individuals with neuro-linguistic/communication problems. Psycho-educational achievement testing and grade level assessments are done for children with scholastic backwardness and academic under achievement. Behavior assessment is done

for children with problem behaviors/skill deficits. Family assessment is done on specific clients requiring family intervention programs. An overview of the total 4903 clients seen in Psycho-diagnostic clinic is given below:

Therapeutic Services:

Therapeutic services are routinely provided for clients with various types of communication disorders. Home based and clinic based remedial training programs are provided for children with scholastic backwardness. Appropriate individual and family guidance and counseling are carried out for clients when necessary. Preadolescent and adolescent individuals with disabilities are given pre-vocational and vocational guidance after appropriate aptitude testing. Neuropsychological retraining programs include attention retraining, memory training or allied cognitive training programs for individuals with neuro-linguistic/communication problems. Individualized behavior counseling, therapy and modification is carried out in clinics as well as home setting for clients reporting behavior problems. Skill training on activities of daily living, functional academics, and functional living skills, social or communicative skills are given for clients showing skills deficits behaviors. Details on nature and type of therapy provided to clients are given in Table III.10.

3. DEPARTMENT OF CLINICAL SERVICES

Clinical services

A total of **40709** clients have been registered during the year with various types of speech, hearing and language disorders. This includes **17276** new clients and **23433** clients who have made repeat visits for the evaluation of their problems.

A total of **7147** and **10820** (including those who were screened informally) clients were seen in speech and language OPD and audiology OPD respectively. A total of **7179**

clients were evaluated in detail for various speech, language problems. The needy clients were also evaluated for associated ENT and psychological problems by the faculty and staff from the respective departments.

Clients requiring further management were given various speech/language therapies with the session of 45 minutes duration. A total of **4907** clients attended speech and language therapy during the year. A total of **21205** individual therapy sessions were provided to the clients. The faculty and clinical staff provide supervision and counseling along with support and guidance to parents for home training.




Fig III.6: State-wise distribution of clients




Fig III.7: Age-wise statistics of clients registered





Fig III.8: Statistics of clients seen in medical records/OPD

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


Fig III.10: Disorder-wise distribution of therapy clients

Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment has selected the institute as the sole authorized agency for electro-acoustic evaluation of random samples of hearing aids distributed in the State/UTs of Karnataka, Orissa, West Bengal, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, Tripura, Assam, Nagaland, Manipur, Sikkim and Mizoram. This year, hearing aids from seven governmental / nongovernmental agencies involved in hearing aid distribution were evaluated under this program.

AIISH Hearing aid dispensing scheme

The institute has started a scheme for dispensing all types of hearing aids at concessional rates. In the report year **1059** hearing aids of different categories and types were distributed under this scheme. Testing, electro-acoustic evaluation and issue of these hearing aids and their after sales service are undertaken by the department.

5. DEPARTMENT OF ENT

- The department of otorhinolaryngology (ENT) offers diagnostic services to clients with various ear, nose and throat diseases. On an average about 50 microscopic examinations and 10 endoscopies are carried out every day. The department offers diagnostic, therapeutic, surgical treatment to about 150 patients per day. Minor procedures like microscopic suction, clearance of ear discharge, removal of foreign bodies, removal of wax, chemical cauterization of perforations etc. are done.
- Endoscopic evaluation of voice and evaluation of vertiginous patients are the main activities of the department.
- The department of ENT, AIISH is running a separate unit (AIISH, ENT 'D' unit) at KR Hospital attached to Mysore Medical College.
- OPD on every Thursday and O.T. on every Friday
- Major surgeries, minor surgical procedures and emergency surgeries are done at KR Hospital. Inpatient facilities are being provided at KR Hospital for patients registered at AIISH.
- ENT 'D' unit, has 20 bedded facilities for patients from the Institute who need surgery. They are evaluated and operated at K.R. Hospital.

6. DEPARTMENT OF PREVENTION OF COMMUNICATION DISORDERS

Hearing Evaluation

Screening for hearing was carried out in various extension activities which included screening newborn infants in hospitals, individuals attending camps and industrial workers.

Infant screening program:

Infant screening was carried out throughout the report year in 9 hospitals in Mysore. All new born infants were screened for hearing using Behavioral Observational Audiometery (BOA), Oto Acoustic Emissions (OAE) screening and administering High Risk Register (HRR). High risk registers were administered to identify those at risk for communication disorders. Table III.22 and Figures III.11 to III.14 provide the details of infant screening activity in the report year.




Figure III. 11: Total Number of Infants screened at various hospitals




Figure III.12: Distribution of factors in infants screened for high risk at various hospitals




Figure III.13: Consanguinity and family history as factors in infants screened at various hospitals




Figure III.14: Proportion of Male and Female infants screened and found to be at risk in various hospitals




Figure III.15: Diagnostic services rendered by the faculty




Figure III.16: Therapeutic services (supervision) rendered by the faculty

B. SPECIALIZED CLINICAL SERVICES

The institute runs specialized clinics to cater to the specific requirements of persons with communication disorders. These clinics are run by various departments of the institute, the details are provided in the following sections.

1. DEPARTMENT OF AUDIOLOGY

Listening Training Unit

Individuals with hearing impairment who have useful residual hearing were provided listening training. Training and guidance was provided to the parents / caregivers of children with hearing impairment, in addition to directly providing training to the clients. Appropriate auditory listening strategies were demonstrated and home training modules were provided. With the use of the CCTV, monitoring of the sessions was made more feasible. This enabled the supervisors to modify the activities and techniques adopted by the student therapist, thereby enhancing the quantum of supervision provided. An average of 734 therapy sessions per month was provided to an average of 163 clients per month. An average of nine cochlear implantees per month received therapy.








Figure III.18: Details of therapy clients offered at AAC and ASD unit

IV. EXTENSION SERVICES

The institute recognizes that there is a need to deliver the services to the unreached, since all clients with communication disorders may not be able to avail the services of the institute due to various reasons. Prevention and identification of the communication disorders in a very early age in children not only facilitates effective rehabilitation but also prevents further adverse consequences of the disorder. This also facilitates appropriate educational and vocational placements in future. Several activities were conducted by the institute as a part of the extension activities to the mass who are in need. The activities undertaken in the report year is presented in the following sections under the respective department headings.

1. PUBLICITY AND INFORMATION

During the period-under report i.e. 2008-09 the PIO section made enormous attempt to cover the activities, programs and visit of dignitaries etc. in the Electronic and Print Media. Some of the main events covered during the year 2008-09 are detailed below.

V. EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Extra-curricular activities are incorporated into the academic programs keeping in focus, the objectives of the institute. The staff, students and clients participated actively in such programs, time to time.

This was then followed by vote of thanks by Mrs. Sangeetha Mahesh.

The program concluded with an interactive session with the participants. Representatives from each college gave positive feedback and were happy to participate in the program. They also requested to arrange for these kind of programs frequently. The clients with stuttering shared their experience about their problem and the strategies used to overcome them.

- 2. AAC Awareness Week was conducted by the institute as part of the International AAC Awareness month. An exhibition of activities and materials related to AAC was arranged in the AAC unit on 3rd, 4th and 5th of November 2008. The focus of this program was titled as "Be aware of, learn and interact about AAC". More than 60 caregivers of clients with various speech, language and hearing disorders, 70 undergraduate and postgraduate students doing various courses in the field of speech and hearing and faculty and staff members visited the exhibition. They were oriented to the purpose, means and materials used for AAC rehabilitation. A written quiz on AAC was formed and this was taken up by 26 visitors. Feedback forms were also obtained from the visitors and the common opinion was that the event should be conducted more frequently and for a larger population.
- 3. **Co-curricular Celebrations:** As part of the co-curricular activities at the preschool various national and religious festivals were celebrated so that the children gain experiential knowledge about the same. Between April 2008 and March 2009, the following celebrations were organised in this regard:
 - a. Ugadi Celebrations were organized on 04.04.2008 and attended by all parents and children. The preschool was decorated with traditional gaiety with picture of goddess Lakshmi adorning the centre stage. The entire preschool premise was festooned with mango and neem leaves in the traditional mode. The celebrations began with a Pooja and followed by devotional songs sung by the Parents and children. The significance of the festival was explained by the special educators in Kannada, Hindi and Malayalam. Traditional prasad of jaggery, tamarind, neem and mangoes were distributed to all present. Special Educators Ms. Asha Kiran E. G. and Ms. Kumudha R. coordinated the programme.
 - b. Vishu Celebrations was organized on 11.04.2008. For the occasion, the preschool was decorated with Lord Krishna's idol and the traditional items of 'Vishukkani'. The celebration involved pooja. This was followed by devotional songs sung by the parents. A skit was performed by the preschool

children depicting the traditional customs associated with Vishu celebrations. The concept was explained by the Special Educators in Kannada, Hindi and Malayalam. All children were made to see '*Vishukkani*' and they were given '*Vishu kaineetam*'. *Unniappam*, the traditional prasada was served to all. The Director presided over the event. Special Educators Mr. Suresh C. B. and Ms. Asha Kiran E. G. coordinated the programme.

- c. **Independence Day Celebrations** were held on 15th August 2008. Children from Preschool, caregivers and staff were actively involved in the celebrations organised at the Institute. The preschool children performed a dance to patriotic song *'rangeela desh rangeela'*. One of the children, Master Kiran, dressed up as *Gandhiji* greeted the dignitaries present at the occasion. The special educators rendered a patriotic song *'janma karini bharatam...'*.
- d. Onam Celebrations were organised on 17th September 2008. The highlight of the celebrations included enacting the legend of '*Mahabali*' by preschool children and performance of '*Tiruvatirkkali*' (Onam dance) by the caregivers. *Kheer* was distributed to all present. The event was graced by faculty and staff. Special Educator Ms. Rasiabi N. and others coordinated the program.
- e. **Bakrid Festival** was celebrated on 26th September 2008. The celebrations included narration of the significance of the festival, as well enacting of the traditional customs observed in the celebrations. Preschool children also performed to a Hindi number *Dheko Chand Aya*. Ladoos were distributed to all present. Special Educators Ms. B. N. Shobha, Ms. Rasiabi and Ms. Rajini Soni coordinated the programme.
- f. Deepavali Celebrations were organised on 10th November 2008. The programme included pooja in the beginning by a senior caregiver. Deepavali message was conveyed by special educators and the significance of the festival was explained by special educators with power point presentation. Sweets distribution and lighting of fireworks were another attraction of the

programme. Earlier in the day, rangoli competition was organised for caregivers of the preschool children. Senior faculty members and staff from different departments graced the occasion and gave away prizes to the winners of the rangoli competitions. Special Educators Ms.H.P.Sumana, Mr.Suresh C.B. and Ms. Vijayalakshmi S. coordinated the program.

- g. Children's Day was celebrated on 14th November. Sweets were distributed to the children and the film 'Tare Zameen Par' was screened for the children and their caregivers. Special educator Ms. Shobha B. N. along with Ms. Ramana Kumari had made arrangements for the screening of the film.
- h. International Day of Persons with Disabilities / World Disabled Day -Commemoration of the 22nd World Disabled Day/International Day of persons with Disability on 3rd December 2008 was coordinated by the Department of Special Education. Two parents of children with special needs children: Ms. Latha Murthy, Secretary, Swasahaya Samuchaaya and Ms. Vanishree Basavaraj were invited as Guests of Honour. Around 550 spectators including clients, caregivers and staff attended the programme. Cultural programmes were presented by AIISH clients and caregivers.
- i. New Year-cum- Christmas Celebrations: were organized on 1st January, 2009. Director and HOD Special Education commenced the celebrations by lighting the candles in the nativity crib that had been arranged. The significance of the events were brought out through various activities like enactment of the nativity scene, narration about the birth of Christ, songs focusing on New Year and visit of Santa Claus. Children of Flower and Colour groups who had won prizes at the competitive events held by the Rotary Club of Mysore in connection with the International Day of Persons with Disabilities were felicitated. Heads and Staff of the departments of Audiology, Clinical Services and POCD had also graced the event. Special Educators Ms. Lata C., and Ms. Ramana Kumari coordinated the programme

- j. **Republic Day Celebrations:** Children from Preschool participated in the event and presented an oration on the significance of the day, a patriotic song and 4 drill exercises with wands, dumbbells, lezimes and hoops. Special Educators Ms. Anjana K. and Ms. Kumudha R. coordinated the programme with active involvement of the caregivers. All staff and caregivers were actively involved in organising the events.
- k. Ugadi celebrations were organized on 30th of March 2009. With active involvement of the caregivers, a special pooja was carried out, after which traditional *Bevu-Bella* and *Obattu* were distributed. The celebrations also included rendering of devotional songs by caregivers, narration-cum-display of the traditional significance of the event by staff and children, and an action song by children. The programme was presided by Director & HOD Special Education, and attended by faculty and staff of other departments at the Institute. Special educators Ms. Anjana K., Ms. Asha Kiran E. G. And Ms. Kumudha R. coordinated the event with active involvement from the parents.
- 4. Field Visits are a primary aspect of the co-curricular activities organised at the preschool, as they are vital for experiential learning and developing practical knowledge in the preschool children. The following preschool celebrations were organised between April 2008 and March 2009:
 - a. Forty-seven children with their caregivers were taken on field trip to KRS on 17th April, 2008. The occasion was used to teach children concepts related to environmental features. Games and play activities were organized for the children as well as their caregivers. Nine staff of the preschool had accompanied the children during the trip.
 - b. Fifteen children along with 15 Caregivers and 10 Special Educators visited the Mysore Zoo & Gombe Mane on 6th October 2008 as part of the Dasara Camp activities. The visit helped the children gain experiential knowledge about animals, especially wild animals that they do not get to see everyday.

- c. As part of Summer Camp activities, 51 children along with caregivers and 9 Special Educators visited the Milk Diary and Science Museum on 16.05.2008. The practical orientation helped children and caregivers appreciate the nutritious value of milk, as well understand the procedure involved in processing milk.
- d. The preschool children were taken for a visit to *Dasara* exhibition in two batches of 55 and 80 children (accompanied by caregivers and staff) on 10th and 17th December 2008 respectively. The visit was sponsored by the Karnataka State Dasara Committee. The visit was educative and entertaining to the children.
- e. Field trips were also arranged as part of curricular skill training at the preschool. Details of such programmes organised during the year are as follows:
 - 40 children (of Kannada and Malayalam *Fruit* groups) along with 10 caregivers and 5 Special Educators were taken to *Fire Station* on 27.01.2009.
 - 10 children (of *Banana* group) along with caregivers were taken to *Petrol Bunk and Shopping Mall* during October, 2008 to teach the concept of public places.
 - 10 children (of *Apple* group) along with Caregivers were taken to *Bogadi Traffic Signals* on November, 2008.
- 5. **Participation won in Extra-mural Competitions:** As a result of the cocurricular training provided at the preschool, the children partake successfully in cultural competitions organised by other agencies.
 - a. Forty-one children of the preschool participated in the 'Tare Zameen Par' fancy dress competition conducted by the Rotary Club of Mysore at Jagan Mohan Palace, Mysore on 20th December 2008. They were grouped into five

- b. The State level Special Olympics for the year 2008-09 was organised by Rotary Club, Mysore on 18.01.2009. Two preschool children won gold medals, namely, master T. N. Srihari for 'Throwing the Ball' and master P. Sheelan Chandra for 'Running Race'.
- 6. Organisation of Camps form an integral part of the co-curricular activities of the preschool. These camps endeavour to add to holistic development in children with special needs as well as enrich the latent talents of caregivers. The following camps were held during the year between April 2008 and March 2009:
 - Summer Camp was held during the summer vacation from 1st to 31st May 2009, and involved activities like Yoga & Physical Exercise, Arts and Crafts, Dance & Music and Games for the children. As part of Summer Camp, a field visit was organised for the children to Mysore Milk Diary and Natural Science Museum. Activities like making nutritious snacks and talent show were organised for parents. Reverse integration i.e., including typically developing children along with special needs children was the highlights of this programme.
 - Dasara Camp was held during the Dasara vacation from 29th September to 12th October 2008 and included activities like Yoga & Physical Exercise, Arts and Crafts, Dance & Music. A visit to the Mysore zoo and *Gombe Mane* was also organised as part of the camp activities.
- 7. Best Caregiver Award is given away periodically to encourage caregivers participation and involvement in the children's education as well as preschool

activities. The following awards were given away in the year between April 2008 and March 2009:

- Caregivers Ms. Leelavathy Chennakeshava & Mr. Chennakeshava, parents of baby Manasa among parents of fruit group, and Ms. Indu, mother of Master Nishanth of flower group were felicitated during *Vishu* celebrations on 11.04.2008.
- Caregivers Ms. Nischal, M/o Baby Sinchana and Ms. Joby M/o Master Jabin from Fruit Groups; and Ms. Nandini, M/o Master Dhyan from Colour Groups were felicitated during the Deepavali Celebrations on 10.11.2008.

NSS Activities

Ever since its introduction in the Institute, the NSS unit is involved in various activities with its imbibed aims and objectives. The programs within the Institute are tailored in such a way that the activities are in accordance with the objectives of the Institute with out modifying the originality of the NSS motto. Even though, activities are few the quality and the impact of the programs to the society is highly satisfactory. They are as follows.

- 1. Educational programs: A special coaching program to the needy students on core subjects of speech and hearing and Kannada teaching classes for the non- Kannada speaking students of the Institute was initiated. Our student volunteers carried out this program for an hour on every weekend on Saturday and Sunday. This is an ongoing program. More than 60 volunteers are benefited with this program.
- 2. **Cultural activities:** Talents day was conducted in which more than 150 students including NSS volunteers participated. In addition, in this program the students were oriented about the philosophy, objective, motto and activities of NSS on 04.09.2008.
- 3. Visit to orphanage: The NSS volunteers along with the staff of the institute visited Chaya Devi Orphanage, Jayanagar, Mysore on 26.03.09. In this visit 55 NSS

volunteers interacted with the inmates & the volunteers also exhibited cultural talents along with inmates. During the visit materials such as provisions, clothes and fruits worth of Rs. 5500.00/- collected from the staff and students of the institute were also distributed. It was a heart touching activity.

- **4. Shramadan activities:** On 30.08.2008 and 27.09.2008, 75 & 55 NSS volunteers respectively participated in the tree planting and watering teak plants program in AIISH campus, Mysore. The watering and maintenance of teakwood plants planted at AIISH, at the newly constructed park opposite to Library and Information centre in the main campus were carried out on five weekends (18.10.08, 26.10.08, 02.11.08, 01.02.09 and 15.02.09) by the NSS volunteers.
- **5. Health programs:** Blood Donation Camp was conducted on 31.03.2009 in AIISH Campus in collaboration with Blood Bank Unit, K.R.Hospital, Mysore. In this noble activity 52 volunteers and staff participated and donated the blood along with the identification of blood group.
- **6.** Adventure activities: A two-day trekking program to Yana & Keppu Joga near Sirsi, Uttara Kannada, Karnataka was conducted. In this program 65 volunteers along with staff successfully completed the breath taking adventurous activity.

Thus, even though the activities were less in number, the academic year 2008-09 was successful in terms of its quality and the impact to the volunteers and public.

AIISH GYMKHANA

Under the banner of AIISH Gymkhana, talent's day for the children of gymkhana members was conducted. Under Vidya Vikas program, the children of staff members, studying upto SSLC were given educational material school bags, books etc.). Guest lectures on LPG safety awareness, Personality improvement and Memory training etc. were held. Apart from this, the AIISH Gymkhana was involved in planning and conducting of 43rd Anniversary celebrations and many other celebrations the details of which are provided underneath:

Open Day: AIISH Gymkhana observed the open day of the institute on 20.11.2008. On this day, the public walk into the institute, go through the facilities and see for themselves the work being done here. They are educated on speech production, hearing mechanism, speech and hearing disorders, prevention of speech and hearing disorders and vocal hygiene. They can get tested themselves on certain aspects off speech, language, hearing, reading and writing. This year the focus was on spreading awareness among students from rural areas.

Kannada Rajyostava Day: This was observed on 20th November 2008. Noted film actor Dr. K.S. Ashwath was the chief guest while Yogashri Dr. A.R Seetharam was the guest of honour. After inauguration of the program by the chief guest, prizes were distributed to the winners of the cultural and sports competitions held on behalf of Kannada Rajyothstva celebrations. Cultural events like group dance and singing Kannada songs were held.

International Woman's day: This celebration was held on 11.3.2009. Dr. Vijayalakshmi Basavaraj, President of Gymkhana and Director, AIISH presided over the function. In her presidential address, she emphasized on the responsibility and importance of being women. Senior women employee of AIISH Smt. J. Raguna and Smt. Nagaveni, caregiver of a student at AIISH who is physically challenged were felicitated on the day. Competitions for women were also conducted.

AIISH Awaaz 2009: AIISH Awaaz, an inter collegiate cultural festival and a platform for college students to show case cultural talents was conducted at AIISH Gymkhana from 13th to 15th March 2009. This was a unique program for the students, by the students and organized by the students themselves with minimum support from the staff. Noted theatre artist, singer and Director Smt. B. Jayashree was the chief guest. Different cultural competitions such as singing, portrait painting, general quiz, skit, antakshari, group dance and fashion show were conducted for the different college students.

VI. OTHER ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES

A. OBSERVANCE OF VIGILANCE AWARENESS WEEK

The employees took the pledge on 3.11.2008 which was read out by Central Vigilance Officer Dr S. R. Savithri, in English, and Dr. H. P. Uma Saraswathi, Hindi Translator in Hindi. Dr. Vijayalakshmi Basavaraj, Director addressed the employees on vigilance and value-based services. Posters related to vigilance were displayed on the notice boards of the institute. A debate competition was also held on 6.11.2008, in which 23 staff and students participated. The topic of the debate was corruption / honesty and there were 3 winners of the competition.

More number of activities on Implementation of Official language Hindi was taken up in the year 2008-09 by way of conducting various programmes and popularizing the official language in all possible ways.

OLI Meetings: The meetings of OLIC were held regularly and proceedings were sent to the concerned.

Hindi Training: Trials for imparting obligatory training in Hindi to staff were continued. Some of the staff members were deputed for attending Hindi examinations.

Hindi speaking clients visiting the institute for their problems were counseled in Hindi.

Word a day in Hindi with English equivalents were displayed at five different prominent places having access for staff, students as well as general public i.e., in Administrative Block, Academic Block, Library, Department of clinical services and Preschool training centre. These words from English to Hindi included Technical and Scientific words for the benefit of student folk in particular.

Reports: Monthly, Quarterly, Half yearly and yearly reports in official language were furnished to the concerned.

Many letters to outside organizations, Office Notes etc., were **signed in Hindi** in addition to sending replies in Hindi to the letters received in Hindi.

Speech & Hearing Glossary 2008 (English-Hindi). This was a maiden attempt for the benefit of the staff and students engaged in this field. This was released on the occasion of Annual day celebrations on 9th August 2008.

Distance Education through Video Conferencing facility has been extended to the clients far and wide in Hindi language having eleven centers at different places in the country. Also, some of the answer scripts written in Hindi by the Diploma students of DHLS programme in Jan 2009, were evaluated in Hindi only.

- Dr. H P Uma Saraswathi, Hindi Translator was deputed to deliver guest lecture at the Hindi Workshop arranged by BSNL, Mysore on 28.07.2008.
- (ii) Dr. H P Uma Saraswathi, Hindi Translator was deputed to attend a National Functional Workshop at the Institute of Public Administration, Bangalore from 22.08.2008 to 23.08.2008.

Workshop: Internal

One day Workshop on translation of Public education materials (focused on ASD) in three Indian languages including Hindi was organized by the Dept. of Material Development at AIISH on 23.03.2009.

Hindi MILAP daily news bulletin was subscribed to.

The Library of Hindi books was kept open for general reading for the staff & students.

Leap Office Software is being extensively used at the institute. Also, use of Microsoft Office software (multiple language editions) is on anvil.

D. MAINTENANCE SECTION

The section was established in July 2007 considering the multifaceted development of the institute.

This section has the responsibility of maintaining electronics, electrical and computers of the entire campus including civil, horticulture and class maintenance.

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Construction

• Renovation of speech block:

The Speech-Language Sciences and Speech-Language Pathology block building have been renovated at an estimated cost of Rs. 54.00 lakhs through the Central Public Works Department.

The civil works portion included reconstruction of in-filled walls, strengthening of existing walls by metal mesh plastering, weather proofing the RCC roof, casting the extended RCC columns above roof, polishing the existing mosaic floor and painting inside & outside the building.

The electrical works such as re-conducting, rewiring and fixing electrical light fittings, fixtures including computer & telephone networking have been carried out.

• Construction of Men's Hostel & Guest faculty suites:

The Men's Hostel & Guest faculty suites are under construction & have a plinth area of 3,720 Sq m for an estimated cost of Rs 495 Lakh. These are being made in the Panchavati campus. The 94 bedded Men's Hostel consists of 40 single rooms, 18 triple rooms, a dining hall to cater 74 persons at a time & a lift. There are 15 rooms in the guest faculty suites.

Horticulture Section

Some of the developmental work such as planning of ornamental shrubs, hedge plants, development of Mexican lawn and shaded grass lawn were carried out.


