Requesting a new journal website

Follow these steps to request a new JPS website for a new or transitioning journal:

- 1. Tell us about your journal. Fill out the JPS New Journal Worksheet Section I (https://jps.library.utoronto.ca/index.php/pubguide/libraryFiles/downloadPublic/6) to provide us with the information needed for the website set up, and email it to jps@library.utoronto.ca (mailto:jps@library.utoronto.ca).
- 2. Sign the service agreement. Once the JPS staff have reviewed your application, sign and submit the JPS Service Agreement (https://jps.library.utoronto.ca/index.php/pubguide/libraryFiles/downloadPublic/36), which outlines both the University of Toronto Libraries' and the Journal Publisher's (the team who creates the journal) responsibilities.
- 3. **Designate a Journal Manager.** The JPS staff will create a journal shell and provide authorization to the person you designate as the Journal Manager. That person will receive login information and will be able to start setting up and customizing the journal.
- 4. **Launch your journal.** Upon creation, your journal will be non-public to allow for setup. Contact the JPS staff when you are ready to go live (usually upon the first Call For Papers or publication of the first issue).

Obtaining an ISSN

An ISSN is a unique 8-digit code used to identify a print or electronic periodical publication.

Is ISSN mandatory?

ISSN is a voluntary identifier. Canadian journal publishers are not legally obliged to obtain or display an ISSN. But if you want to have your journal indexed for more visibility and impact, you should have an ISSN assigned to your journal.

Canadian journal publishers can obtain ISSN from ISSN Canada (http://www.bac-lac.gc.ca/eng/services/issn-canada/Pages/issn-canada.aspx#tc1).

Remember that you need a distinctive ISSN for a print vs electronic version of your journal (the latter sometimes known as e-ISSN) and that you need to obtain a new ISSN if the journal title has changed.
