
An Overview to Auditory Training

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



Auditory training is used for children with hearing impairment to maximize the use of their hearing abilities. It can be done only if the child is fitted with useful hearing aids / cochlear implant as early as possible. Auditory training is usually recommended for children who have a fair understanding of speech.


Auditory training helps children with hearing impairment to:
