Her PhD studies relate to sociology of law and lately has developed courses on decision making and problem solving. She has written with Darío Rodríguez Consorcios *Tecnológicos. At this moment she is a professor at the Faculty of Engineering at the Universidad Diego Portales in Chile. Between the years 1978 and 1981 he develops his postgraduate studies at Bielefeld University, Germany, under the academic direction (Doktorvate) of Niklas Luhmann. In 1981 he achieves his doctorate (Dr. Soz. Wiss.) at Bielefeld University. Professor Rodriguez has dedicated his academic life to the study of Social System's Theory, organizations and sociology of law. (2006) (Co-author); Comunicaciones de la Organización (2007) (co-author). At this moment he is a professor at the Faculty of Engineering at the Universidad Diego Portales in Chile. He also teaches at the Faculty of Communications at the Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile.
