

Pass/Fail Grades

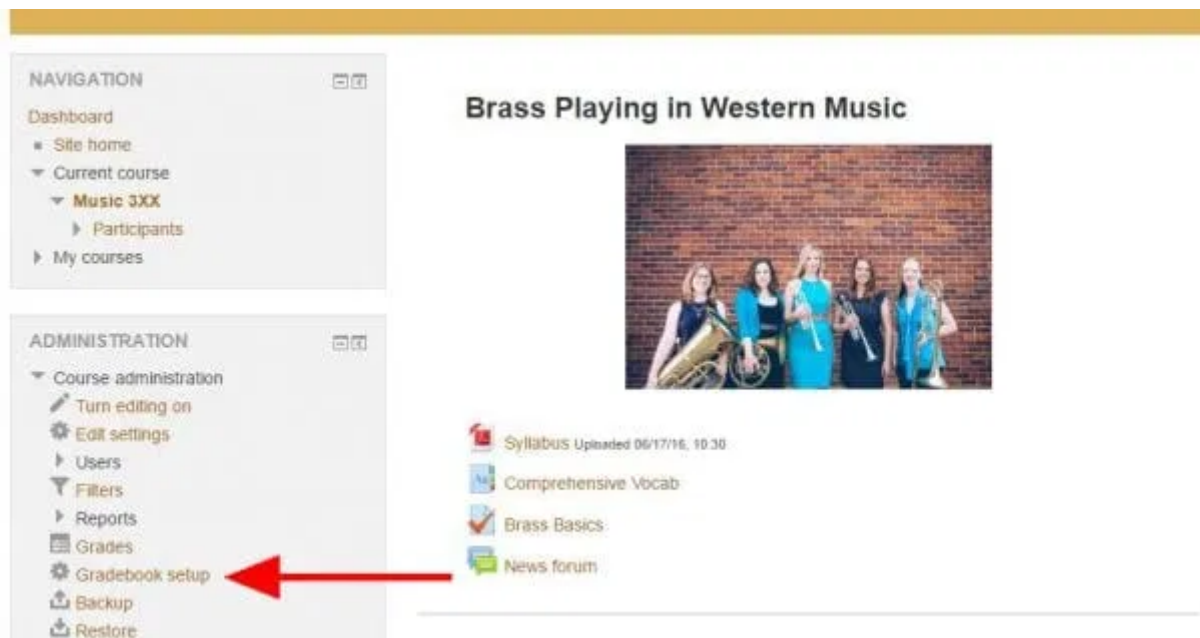
Moodle's gradebook has the ability to allow grading by qualitative scales. One of the default St. Olaf scales is pass/fail. There are a variety of ways to integrate this scale into activities and the gradebook.

How do I grade an assignment as pass/fail?

Changing the grade type for online Moodle activities and for offline assignments require different processes. Each is described below.

Online Moodle Activities

1. Navigate to **Gradebook setup** in the **Administration** block.



2. Select the name of the activity.
3. In the **Administration** block, select **Edit settings**.

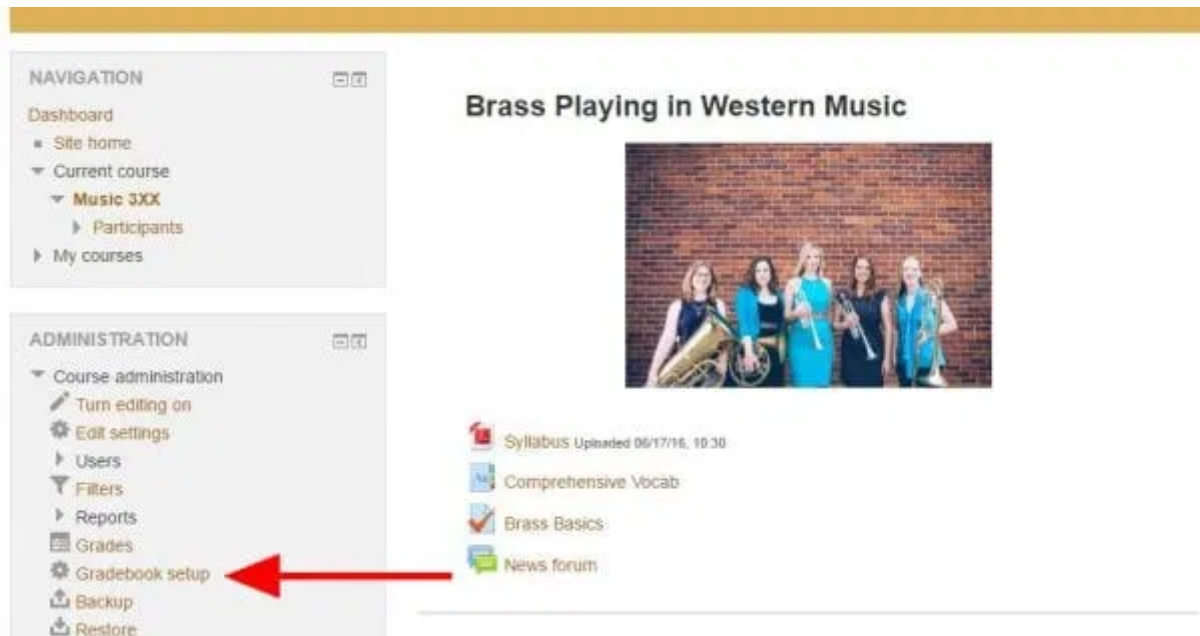
5. Change the **Grade** type to be **Scale**.

6. Select **Pass/fail** as the scale.

7. Select **Save and display** at the bottom of the page.
8. Use the activity's grading interface to assign grades. For assignments, this is linked as **View/grade submissions**.

Offline Grade Items

1. Navigate to **Gradebook setup** in the **Administration** block.



2. Select **Edit** in the Actions column and then **Edit settings**.

3. For **Grade type**, select **Scale**.
4. Select **Pass/fail** as the scale.
5. Select **Save changes**.

Will a pass/fail grade item impact a student's final grade?

It depends what that grade item's weight is. Navigate to **Gradebook setup**. If you are using natural weighting, any non-zero value in front of a grade item will impact the category's aggregation and the final grade. To remove an item's impact on grade completely, change its weight to 0. This way, that pass/fail item will simply serve as confirmation that a student passed a required skill.

How do I grade a student's final grade pass/fail?

Unfortunately Moodle does not support this feature. To do this by hand, evaluate whether the student fails or passes based on percent.
