What is the Gradebook?

Moodle's built-in gradebook is a useful tool for both professors and students. Scores from Moodle assignments are automatically added from their respective activities pages, and all assignments are visible in one screen. The Moodle gradebook inherits its scores and settings from activities on your course page, so using the gradebook is fairly simple. If there is a setting you would like to change and it is not in gradebook settings, it can probably be found on the activity's settings page. The following guide will answer your questions, including:

Why should I use the Moodle gradebook?

Convenience

Because scores are entered automatically from online activities, there is no need to retype or transfer scores. Even manually entered scores for offline assignments are easy; just type the scores into the correct boxes. Navigating the gradebook is fairly straightforward too with its dropdown menu of views. Communication

Students can monitor their progress throughout the course and make adjustments accordingly. Text feedback can be given in addition to or in lieu of a numerical score. While seeing their grade online in not a substitute for visiting during office hours, it gives students the chance to observe how their efforts impact their grade.

Flexibility

The gradebook has numerous functions, including:

- Grade import/export
- Custom grade aggregation
- Text feedback
- Missing/late work marking

- Grade categories for organization
- Custom letter grade boundaries
- Scores based on qualitative scales

How do I view my course gradebook?



How do TAs view my gradebook?

- 2. In the Administration block, select Grades.



3. Users with the TA/Grader role will arrive at either the **Overview report** or **User report** by default.

TAs can grade online activities by selecting the hyperlinked assignment name in the **User report**. There they can grade that activity only. TAs cannot grade manually-added, offline assignments. These assignments are denoted with a pencil icon in the User report..

If your course uses manually-added, offline assignments, it may be useful to assign your TA the role of Non-editing Teacher instead. <u>Learn more about Moodle roles (https://wp.stolaf.edu/it/?page_id=9455)</u> to decide which role is best for your TA(s).

How are scores added to the gradebook?

The full process is explained in the <u>using the gradebook guide (https://wp.stolaf.edu/it/?page_id=10122)</u>, but a basic summary is provided here.

First you must grade each activity on its own. Scores are then automatically added to the gradebook from the activity page. All activities have unique <u>grade settings (https://wp.stolaf.edu/it/?page_id=10014)</u>that can be changed through the activity's settings, not gradebook settings. If there is a setting you would like to change and you cannot find it in gradebook settings, check the activity's settings instead.

Scores can also be added for offline assignments like exams and seminars. These scores must be imported or entered manually. Adding and grading offline assignments is discussed in the <u>using the gradebook guide</u> (<u>https://wp.stolaf.edu/it/?page_id=10122</u>).

How can I organize my gradebook?

Within the gradebook, you can create categories for assignments, such as assignments, exams, and class work. Categories are weighted or assigned percentages of the overall grade, depending on the grade aggregation settings of your course. Assignments can be rearranged within these categories as well. Organizing the gradebook is discussed in gradebook setup (https://wp.stolaf.edu/it/?page_id=10053).

How are overall grades calculated?

The answer to this question depends on the <u>grade aggregation strategy (https://wp.stolaf.edu/it/?</u> <u>page_id=10043)</u> used in your gradebook. Natural weighting is based on the point value of an assignment out of the total points in the course or category. (The more points, the larger percentage.) Weighted means use arbitrary weights to determine the impact of each assignment. (More points in an assignment does not necessarily mean it has a larger impact.)
